# PIRATES FALL BEFORE ASSUMPTION

Assumption base-ball team had its first taste of left-hand pitching Saturday evening, when they met the Windsor Pirates on the home diamond and defeated them 8-4. Durand pitched the entire game, and although more liberal with his hits than was the case a week ago, yet he was seldom hard straight and pitched a fine game. The visitors employed three gurners during the fray, two of whom delivered from the portside.

The Pirates scored in the first innings with the aid of a hit and an error, and in the same inning Assumption tied the count. An opportunity to break the tie was lost when Jacques fanned in the same inning with Shanesy waiting on second.

In the second frame Assumption tallied twice with the help of two bats swung by Messrs. Lowery, Wagner and Durand. The visitors were retired in order. The third inning saw a change of pitchers on the part of the Pirates, Clark, a right-hander, taking the mound. He was for a while master of the situation and only three men faced him that inning. Shanesy fanned and O'Brien and Jacques flied out.

The fourth inning saw each team score again. Assumption scored once and the Pirates pushed two across, when O'Brien fumbled Ausburne's fly to short center. In the fifth inning the Pirates scored one more. Lowery's timely hitting played an important part in the sixth. Polomski fouled out, Shanesy fanned, and Jacques doubled to center; Zott walked, and Mr. Lowery then doubled to left scoring the two men on the bags.

Laesser pitched the last three innings for the visitors. Durand was the first man to face him and was safe on an error, and Noon was also safe for the same reason; on the pay Durand was nipped sliding in third. O'Brien forced Polomski out at second and Shanesy flied out. Durand struck out two men in this inning and the other hit and easy roller to third. In the eighth inning two of the visitors tried to slide long drives past Mr. Jacques but the Assumption manager cut them off with two fine catches. Assumption scored the last two runs this inning. Durand bunted and Noon followed with a single. Issacs tied to nip Durand but threw wild and both runners scored.

The visitors collected ~~xxxxxxxx~~ ten hits from Durand, while Assumption was able to slam only seven safeties. Durand set ten Pirates down after giving them three healthy whiffs at the ozone; five Assumption men struck out. Jimmie Burns, former Assumption star catcher and first secker was among the spectators and remarked afterwards that it was a very fine game. He further stated that this year's team stood high in the opinion of the Alumni because of the team's victory over the Mint-leaguers.
