Col. "Ken" MacIntyre Takes P.C. Nomination in Good Style

It was in excellent fashion that Colonel Kenneth MacIntyre took the Progressive-Conservative nomination at Patterson Collegiate last Tuesday night for the Essex West federal riding.

For those who had never heard nor seen "Ken" previously and even for old acquaintances and friends, he was magnetic in his bidding speech. "The mounting interest for a return of good government is evident everywhere", was the opening sentence which brought his large audience to a solemn attention.

The old Windsorites who knew "Ken" in his "three-corner pants" as well as the younger folk who had brought further enthusiasm to the meeting were obviously halted to civil attention.

Rounds of applause to the speaker's clear-cut point-by-point program gave the observers an early indication of the final results. In fact, a first ballot gave him a majority over a second candidate, Mr. Warren Bolton, who was far from being a mere last hour contestant.

Another statement by the nominee was noteworthy. "When economic freedom is lost, political freedom is lost." The nomination had the dignity, the interest and the enthusiasm of a good convention. It was enhanced by many of the Party's old and new guardians. Mr. Smith, M.P., Calgary, Alta., guest speaker of the evening, brought good food for thought to the feast.

As pointed out in the daily press only a few days ago, the now sitting Member for Essex West, Mr. Donald Brown, will face the strongest electoral opposition in the history of the riding, come the federal election.

Windsor Airport OK'ed by DMAA

SPLIT LEFT ON CANADIAN SIDE

A major obstacle was overcome last Tuesday for the Area Air Authority for Detroit Metropolitan when a staff report was approved by a 5-2 majority. It was due to a compromise of the Detroit-Wayne Major Airport headed by Commissioner Leroy C. Smith, a Commission long opposed to the hampering of that development.

But still, all is not rosy on the Canadian side of the multi-million dollar project.

This newspaper was informed, to the last deadline minute, that the International Airport idea has been considered by many residents of LaSalle, Sandwich West and surrounding portions of the vicinity as a big boom for some and a devastating affair to others.

Sandwich West Township for instance, still with a \$2 million municipal debt and most of the residents now well established and well represented by the newly elected Council, is strongly opposed to anything but moving the site about a mile Southward, where most vacant property still lies. Strong feeling has already been expressed as "another coup by the big real estate shots that caused the ruination of suburban Windsor in the past twenty years."

From other sources we are informed that it would cost about \$4 millions to displace over 400 established homes, tiled land and thriving small businesses. The assessment value is in eminent danger all over and the few interested in selling at a good profitable expropriation figure, will have to contend with strong opposition, likely a majority. Fires—One of the most tragic holiday seasons from fire occurred over the Christmas holiday season in 1948. In Chatham, Captain George Hill lost his life while fire fighting. Newspaper headlines of other tragic incidents were:

Sault Ste. Marie, December 26—Parents and Baby Trapped in Home Burned to Death; Orillia, December 27—Mother, Babe Die in Blaze, Girl Critical; Brantford, December 27—Explosion Burns Brantford Woman; Renfrew, December 26—Lonely Elderly Man Is Severely Burned When Lighting Lamp; Carrying Place, December 27—Heat of Flames Prevents Son Rescuing Father; Toronto—Matches Blamed When Girl of Three Burned About Hip; Richmond Hill, December 26—Two Nursery Boys Die in Christmas Tree Fire.

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Chief POLICE

Every time old man winter goes away and then comes back again, drivers of cars have to learn all over again how to drive safely on icy or snowy surfaces, says Chief of the police department.

"The sensible motorist," says the chief, "makes it a point to 'get the feel' of the road before he goes very far. That means giving yourself a safe little demonstration of just how much or how little control of your car is possible under existing weather and road conditions. You can do this by trying out the brakes or by 'gunning' the motor so that you skid—while you're still going slowly, of course, and when there isn't any traffic around.

"It's better to find out your limitations right at the start, than to find out later—by hav-

ing an accident," the chief declares. "By testing your car's behaviour first, you will probably impress on your mind the degree of danger on ice or snow. Then you can adjust your driving technique accordingly. In general that means:

- (1) Cutting down your speed;
- (2) Using second gear to slow your car down before a stop, combined with a 'pumping' action on your brakes;
- (3) Lengthening the distance between your own car and the one ahead;
- (4) Using tire chains: tests

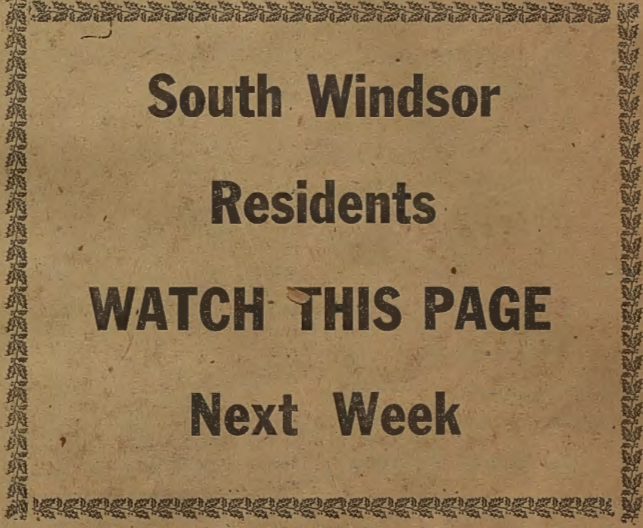

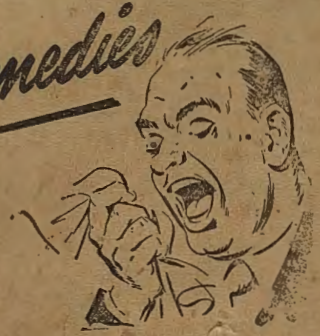
