N JANUARY 5th, Father J. Stanley Murphy, C.S.B., Director of the Assumption College Lecture League announced that Jacques Maritain, noted French philosopher would be the recipient of the 1942 Christian Culture Award. This Christian Culture Award. This award which was established in 1941 and awarded then to Madame Sigrid Undset is a direct outgrowth of the Christian Culture Series of lectures. These lectures, so familiar to Alumni, have in less than eight years presented to audiences, drawn from the Michigan and Ontario area, over one hundred speakers of inter-national renown. The Christian Culture Award will be presented each year to some outstanding layexponent of Christian ideals.

Professor Jacques Maritain is very probably the greatest living Christian thinker and a great force in con-temporary philosophy. He has been guest-professor at the great univerguest-professor at the great universities of three continents and at present is giving a month's lectures at the Pontifcial Institute of Medieval Studies, St. Michael's College, Toronto. He is the author of "St. Thomas Acquinas," "Three Reformers," "Art and Scholasticism," "True Humanism," "Introduction to Philosophy" and many other books.

His visits to the former are always welcomed with a heartfelt tenderness toward a worthy son, whilst his thoughtful consideration, and genial warmth toward the latter are but a manifestation of the buoyancy and sweetness of a youth that still endures after all these years.

Nor is the Class of '96 unmindful of the worth of this her successful son so firmly established in the affections of her alumni, who, to show their estimate of his performance, have chosen him as permanent president of their class.

Much might be written to disclose the varied characteristics of this loyal alumnus, his generosity, his unfailing hopeful spirit, his steadfastness, or as Horace puts it "Justum ac tenacem praepositi", — and a word—his wonderful personality that inspires courage, confidence and a lofty conception of the dignity of things worthwhile.

#### Monsignor Laurendeau

THE well-known Alumnus, who is the subject of this brief sketch, was born some years ago in Chatham, Ont. It was there that he attended the Separate School and later the High School. Then the pursuit of knowledge took him farther, to Ste. Therese College near Montreal where he spent six years. In 1896 he came to Assumption to begin his Philosophy. On the completion of these studies, our young student went west to Butte, Montana. In the following year, he entered the Grand Seminary in Montreal.

On December 19th, 1903, Bishop McEvoy raised the young seminarian to the dignity of the priesthood in St. Joseph's Church in his hometown, Chatham. In January of the following year, we find him a curate at St. Joseph's Church in Stratford. His first pastorate came in 1905 when he went to St. Augustine's. Father Laurendeau weathered the heavy snows of five winters serving the faithful in this parish. Then in the fall of 1920 Bishop Fallon ap-pointed him pastor of St. Martin's Church in London. During his years at London, he built the Church and Rectory. While these buildings were in the course of construction, the contractor failed. Nothing daunted however, the resourceful pastor finished the work himself.

It was almost twenty years after his student days at Assumption that Father Laurendeau returned to the Border Cities. In September 1917 he became pastor of Our Lady of the Lake Church in what was then Ford City. Further recognition of his priestly labors came in 1926 when he succeeded the late Very Reverend D. J. Downey as Dean of Essex County and in 1930 when he was named a Domestic Prelate by Pope Pius XI.

In the years that followed his coming to Our Lady of the Lake, Monsignor Laurendeau, has seen his congregation grow and within the original boundaries of his parish, three other parishes have been established.

Since his student days, the Dean has always shown his warm affection for Assumption. This affection is reflected in his frequent visits to the College. No important event in the life of the College finds him absent.

#### Father Hewlett

THE ALUMNUS whom we sketch in this issue was born in Jackson, Michigan sixty-seven years ago. His primary education was obtained in his native city. In the year 1889 the name of Francis W. Hewlett was first placed on the rolls of Assumption College, as a member of the class designated in those days as Elementary Latin. The young student from Jackson spent the next five years at the College and completed his course as a member of Rhetoric of 1894. Some other noted members of this class were the late Father Frank Foster C.S.B., Monsignor Frank T. Sullivan, Monsignor P. J. O'Connell, Fathers Joseph McCabe, Joseph Marx and Michael Crowley. From Assumption Frank Hewlett was sent by his bishop to Cincinnati to prepare for the priest-hood at St. Mary's Seminary. In 1898 he was ordained a priest and sang his first Solemn Mass in the church and city of his boyhood.

Father Hewlett was not to spend any time in his priestly career as an assistant for he was immediately appointed pastor of Pinnebog in the Thumb of Michigan. It was a remote section but the young priest was equal to the trials and difficulties of his first charge and by his zeal and leadership was an example to his flock. During the thirteen years of his pastorate at Pinnebog, he erected a beautiful church and rectory.

In November 1911, we find the industry and priestly endeavours of our alumnus transferred from the rural community of Pinnebog to the metropolis of Michigan, when Father Hewlett assumed the pastorate of St. Charles Borromeo in Detroit. He has been there ever since, and in the years that have intervened, has seen the parish grow from humble beginnings to its present position among the most out-standing in Detroit. In 1911, there were three frame buildings, the church, school and rectory. St. Charles has today five modern brick buildings which form an architectural unit, the church, rectory, school, convent and the most recentcese.

#### Bishop O'Connor

MOST Reverend Denis O.Connor, Bishop of Peterborough, was born near St. Augustine, Ontario in 1884. In a district that has given many priests to the Church, he spent his youth making ready for college for he had a family tradition to maintain and a great namesake to

After entering Assumption College in 1900, he quickly made it clear that the College had a student of extraordinary ability, though he never sought to be distinguished in any way above his fellow students. On the contrary, he avoided the spot-light, which he could easily have held but which was to him most distasteful. The future bishop was a member of Rhetoric 1903 and graduated in Philosophy in 1905. In the Grand Seminary in Montreal, where he studied theology, he was always among the leaders in academic standing.

After his ordination in June 1909, he was appointed to St. Alphonsus, Windsor, and soon was much in demand as a special preacher.

When the late Bishop Fallon opened St. Peter's Seminary in London, in 1912, he named Father O'Connor to the staff. The following year he succeeded the late Father J. V. Tobin as rector. It was a post for which his talents and zeal fitted him in a special manner. He surrounded himself with an able corps of professors and established a religious regime that has endured, because he implemented the best traditions of his Sulpician masters. His own teaching of Dogmatic Theology will always be remembered by his students for the order, lucidity and erudition of his presentation. In 1915 he became Vicar-General of the diocese of London and in 1919 he was made a Domestic Prelate by the Holy See.

In January of 1930, Monsignor O'Connor was named Bishop of Peterborough and consecrated in June of that year. He has exercised a most successful administration of his see. By close attention to every detail of his many duties, by kindliness and the natural charm of his personality, he has endeared himself to clergy and laity alike. May God grant him many years of health and strength to labor for the welfare of souls and the Church.

REV. THOMAS VINCENT MOYLAN, C.S.B., formerly vice-president of Assumption College, died at dawn Easter Sunday at St. Basil's Seminary, Toronto, in his 61st year. He had been spiritual adviser at St. Basil's for the past 12 years.

A native of Toronto, the son of William and Penelope Moylan, he received his early education at St. Basil's Separate School and graduated from St. Michael's College.

#### ORDAINED IN 1906

He was ordained a priest of the Community of St. Basil in 1906. He joined the staff of Assumption College that year and taught there for nine years.

From 1915 to 1916 he served as Superior of St. Basil's College, Waco, Texas. Returning to Assumption College, he held the position of vice-president until 1922, when he became master of novices at St. Basil's novitiate, Toronto.

In 1925 he again joined the teaching staff of Assumption, where he remained until 1930, when he returned to St. Basil's Seminary.

Surviving are a brother, William Moylan, of Toronto, and three sisters, Miss Katherine Moylan and A. J. Stirling. Mrs. S. G. Crowell, both of Toronto, and Mother Mary Rose of the Ursuline Order at Chatham.

#### Alumnus, 23, Dies In Jap Attack

EUGENE DAUGHERTY, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Daugherty of Fostoria, Ohio, gave his life for his country when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941, 'Gene' was an electrician's mate 3rd class and was aboard the U.S.S. Arizona. On December 21st, his parents were officially notified that their son was missing and a month later the Navy Department informed them of his death.

'Gene' enrolled as a Freshman at Assumption in September, 1936, after his graduation from St. Wendelin's High School in Fostoria. During the two years spent at Assumption, his fine character and cheerful disposition won him many friends. He was a member of the Assumption Junior Ontario Basketball finalists in 1937.

After enlisting on January 23rd, 1940, Eugene trained at Great Lakes. Illinois. Later he was assigned to the U.S.S. Arizona. His entire enlistment was spent in Hawaii. He was twenty-three years of age.

#### Bishop Murphy

THE Most Reverend William F. Murphy, first Bishop of Saginaw was born in Kalamazoo on May 11, 1885; graduated from Assumption in Philosophy, 1904; completed theological course and won Doctorate at Propaganda College in Rome, 1908; awarded Licentiate in Canon Law at Appolinaris College in Rome, 1909; was curate at St. Thomas Parish, Ann Arbor, 1910-12; at Holy Cross Parish, Marine City, 1912-19; at SS. Peter and Paul Cathedral, 1919-21; named first pastor of St. David parish, Detroit, in 1921 and here he remained until 1938, the year he was chosen by the Holy See to head the new Diocese of Saginaw. He was appointed to his present bishopric on March 17, took his motto from the collect of the Mass read on that feast, was consecrated on May 17, and took possession of his diocese on June 1.

Back to Kalamazoo and to the Murphy home. What do we see? William Murphy and his six sisters with his widowed mother-a home of prayer, of faith, of deep trust in God's goodness. Did six sisters spoil young William, the only son? Any six sisters could have done just that but his mother and Dean O'Brien were on guard. To know Mrs. Murphy and the Dean was to know that the future bishop was well watched. But his sisters . . . I must make amends to them. If the prayers of holy women avail much (three of his sisters are religious of St. Joseph) then the student, cleric, pastor and monsignor, had more than enough help to keep him on the right path.

May we chat about the bishop? He will not mind. He is the same today as when I first met himfriendly and fatherly, with enough Murphy in him to make one a bit cautious, with enough dignity to make one respectful, with enough humor to make one enjoy his company, with enough stability to make one trustful, and with enough kindness to make one always sure of a welcome at his home. In him episcopal dignity and human friendliness have formed a happy union.

Do not say: Sancte Gulielme, ora pro nobis; but say: if one of his former assistants believes what he has written, why shouldn't we all?

## Pilot Girardot Missing In Action

#### Alumnus Believed To Have Been Shot Down In Rev. J. B. Flanagan, C.S.B., In Daylight R.C.A.F. Raid On Augsburg

CERGEANT EDMOND DAVID GIRARDOT, bomber pilot in the Royal Canadian Air Force, twenty-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis R. Girardot, formerly of Windsor, was reported missing on April 18th. The day before he had participated with other Canadian fliers in a daring daylight raid over Augsburg, Germany. For heroism displayed on that day, Edmond's leader has since been awarded the Victoria Cross. Five bombers of his command were shot down in the engagement.

Edmond was born in Windsor the son of an alumnus and veteran of the last war and attended St. Francis School. He began high school at Assumption in September 1935 and graduated on June 9, 1939, after a very successful course. His studies in Fifth form were interrupted in December 1939 when his family moved to Ottawa. He enlisted in the capital in Novem-

ber 1939.

Francis A. Girardot, a brother is with the R.C.A.F in England. The Girardot family have not given up hope that Edmond is still alive and this is also the prayers of the many friends he made at Assumption.

## Dies of Pneumonia In Dearborn

N Sunday, May 3, Father Joseph Berchmans Flanagan, C.S.B., died from pneumonia, at St. Joseph's Retreat at Dearborn. Father Flanagan had been in poor health for over seven years. He was born forty years ago in Wallaceburg, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Flanagan. After his primary and secondary education in Wallaceburg schools, he entered Assumption in 1919. He finished Rhetoric in 1920. The following year he taught at St. Thomas College at Chatham, N.B.

He returned to Assumption the following year and took his B.A. in 1923. On August 1st that year he entered St. Basil's Novitiate in Toronto. A year later he began his study of theology at St. Basil's Seminary in Toronto and was or-dained on June 30, 1928, in St. Basil's Church, Toronto.

Father Flanagan spent the years 1928 to 1930 at Aquinas Institute in Rochester, N.Y. Successive appointments took him to St. Michael's College, Toronto, Assumption and again to St. Michael's.

The funeral took place in Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Detroit with burial in the Basilian plot at Assumption Cemetery in Sandwich.

In paying tribute to his departed confrere, Very Rev. H. Carr, C.S.B., said that if there was ever a Basilian martyr, it was Father Flanagan, U.S. Army: Clarence Blaesser, Robt. McCann, Jos. Margern, Paul who so long and so heroically bore David Welch, Ted Petri, Wm. Beuglet, Tom Searles, Clarence his particular cross with Christian fortitude.

#### Father McCabe

TERY REV. JOHN J. McCABE was born in the parish of St. Patrick's at Northfield, Mich. After attending grade school in Ann Arbor, he began his High School course at Assumption where he was to remain till his graduation from Rhetoric in 1894. Other members of this class included Father Charles Henigan, Dr. John Keho, Fathers Patrick Troy, S.J., Jas Kelly and Stanislaus Cappe, S.A.

At Mount St. Mary Seminary in Cincinnatti, John McCabe pursued his theological studies and on July 2, 1899, was ordained by the late Bishop Foley.

The young levite was first ap-pointed to assist at St. Stephen's at Port Huron, where he remained till 1902. In that year he was named pastor of St. John the Baptist Church at Hubbardston and in that rural community he was untiring in his efforts which included the founding of a mission at neighboring Pewamo, and the erection of the present church there.

In 1915, Father McCabe was called by his Bishop to Detroit, to found a new parish in the Northwest section of that city. St. Theresa's parish has grown to be one of the most important parishes in the Archdiocese of Detroit. Much of its spiritual and material growth is the result of the zeal and guidance of its founder.

The increase in the members of souls to be cared for meant the construction of larger buildings and the fine church, school, convent and rectory today reveal that the pastor of St. Theresa's planned and executed well and secured the faithful cooperation of his parishioners in all his endeavors.

Father McCabe has always been a very loyal alumnus of Assumption. At times in the past he has held positions on the Alumni Executive and gave valuable aid and

advice.

While Father McCabe is not able to visit the college as frequently as we would wish, from his first days at St. Theresa's he has had a member of the college staff assisting him on Sundays and thus is able to follow Assumption activities.

May this worthy alumnus enjoy many more years in the parish he

has served so well.

#### Father Cullinane

FATHER Eugene M. Cullinane, Class of '89, will celebrate his Golden Jubilee of Ordination on July 1 in Jackson, Mich.

Like so many of the men who belong to that generation of pioneer priests which came out of Assumption in the 80's and 90's, Father Cullinane is a man of strikingly rich and powerful personality He has in him something of the character of his Irish forbears and something of the character of the early Basilians at Sandwich. For he was formed in both those schools. There is something of steel about the man. There is also in him a childlike simplicity of soul and a great charity. These latter qualities are a reflection of those great and beloved souls, Father (later Archbishop) O'Connor, Father Mungovan, Father Cushing and Father McBrady.

Possessing a native genius for organization and an almost inexhaustible energy in the pursuit of objectives, he has planned carefully and executed well the growth and development of St. Mary's Parish. The beautiful and majestic church is one of the finest on the American continent and a lasting monument to the spirit of the priest and the faith of the people who built it.

His life has been completely bound up with the life of his people. Father Cullinane's joys are the joys of his parish, its sorrows his sorrows. He was, and is, a pastor in the literal meaning of the word. Not a man, or a woman, or a child, across the fifty years, has escaped his fatherly vigilance and his pastoral care.

At 75 years of age he is as tireless as ever, and the writer was truly amazed last summer to see him get in his car early of a Sunday morning and drive off on a long round of missionary labors that many men in the prime of life would consider exhausting.

The greatest and most impressive work of Father Cullinane's long priestly life will probably never come to light short of eternity. Probably in the confessional was best revealed the true characteristics that made for his inner greatness—the sympathy, the kindness, the love of a priestly heart.

One evening during the last war, it was almost nine o'clock in the study hall. The accustomed two decades of the beads were finished. It was now the turn of the new student to make his maiden speech, in the form of reciting the evening prayers. He clutched the book nervously. His first words were, 'Assumption College, Sandwich, Ontario' as printed on cover. He read the book from cover to cover. I forget his name, but I know that Fr. McGee who was in charge that night did not wear the undisturbed mien, as in a critical moment in some championship games. When the parade arrives at church early some Sunday, I will appoint an alumnus to read the memorable prayers of old Assumption. If he wants to rise from Sandwich to God in one breath as did the newcomer in the study hall, so much the better. Assumption and the spiritual are synonymous. We all enjoy Alumni Chatter. My faithful 'aide de camp' Louis Bergeron is also an alumnus. He has been with me two years. When we say Mass in the field, he can erect our collapsible cathedral in a few minutes."

#### Monsignor Sullivan

RT. REV. FRANCIS T. SULLI-VAN, one of the many notable members of the noted class of Rhetoric 1894, was born in Bellevue, Upon completion of his studies at Alma Mater, he enrolled at St. Mary's Seminary in Cincinnati for his philosophical and theological courses, and was ordained to the Priesthood on June 17, 1898 in Nashville, Tennessee, in which dio-cese he had become incardinated during his first year as a seminarian.

For two years our young priest served as assistant at St. Joseph's parish in Nashville. At the turn of the century, Father Sullivan was appointed to St. Patrick's Church, Memphis, where he fulfilled his priestly duties till 1911.

Since that year our noted alumnus has been pastor of SS. Peter and Paul Church in Chattanooga. In the more than 30 years of his pastorate, Msgr. Sullivan has shown enduring love for the children of his flock and a profound interest in Catholic education. Notre Dame School in Chattanooga is a monument to his efforts and energy in accomplishing great things from small beginnings. A high class institution of learning, it is one of his dearest interests and a distinct credit to the city.

Msgr. Sullivan's endeavors have not been limited to his parish, since he has served as diocesan consultor since 1914 and a rural dean since 1917. In recognition of his distin-guished service to the Church, Pope Pius XI raised him to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor on June

## Two Are Missing In Air Battles

SERGEANT Pilot Patrick Louis Murphy, of the R.C.A.F., died in action over England after a flight to France and was buried in Upavon Cemetery in England, according to an official despatch re-The deceased aviator was a Freshman at Assumption in 1936. He was in his 24th year. Enlisting in the R.C.A.F. shortly after the war began, he had been overseas nearly a year and had been in action frequently. Sergeant Murphy was a cousin of Father Stanley Murphy,

RT. REV. Herbert F. Hillenmeyer is a native Kentuckian, having been born in Lexington on August 9, 1878. He came to Assumption in September, 1891, and completed his studies in June, 1897.

For seven years the young priest served as assistant at St. Mary's Cathedral at Covington, Kentucky. Then he was appointed pastor of St. Joseph's, Winchester, where he built a new church.

His next appointment was that of Chancellor of the Diocese of Covington in December, 1915, a position Father Hillenmeyer held till March, 1925, when he became pastor of his present charge, St. Thomas Church, Fort Thomas, Kentucky. Since that time, he has built a church which is one of the most attractive in the locality. His administrative ability is revealed in the fact that the church is practically out of debt.

Father Hillenmeyer's work in the diocese was recognized by the Holy See in Marcn, 1936, when he was named a Domestic Prelate with the title of Rt. Rev. Monsignor.

Monsignor Hillenmeyer continues to lead a busy life in his pastoral duties. His friends among the alumni will be interested to learn that the years have somewhat thinned his hair but have not changed its color.

#### Rev. H. D. Sullivan

FATHER Henry D. Sullivan is a native of Detroit where he was born on August 27, 1866. He came to Assumption in September, 1884. After two years at the college he began his studies for the priesthood at the diocesan seminary at Monroe, Michigan, in September, 1886. In 1889 he began the study of theology at St. Mary's Seminary in Balti-more. Ill health forced the young seminarian to suspend his studies for a while but he resumed them at Assumption in 1891 and on July 2, 1893, he was ordained to priesthood by the late Bishop Foley.

The young priest's first appointment was that of pastor at Sacred Heart Church, Dearborn. The fol-lowing year he went to Reese, Michigan, where he was pastor of St. Elizabeth's for five years. In 1889 he became pastor of St. John's Albion, and remained there two years. A pastorate of twelve years at St Joseph's Church, Adrian,

Michigan, followed.

In September, 1913, Father Sullivan founded All Saints' Church on Fort Street, Detroit, where he has ministered eyer since. It is in this parish that his priestly zeal has become especially manifest. In close to thirty years he has erected a fine church, rectory, school and convent and the parish has practically no debt today, due to the fine co-operation of the members who have for the most part, very modest incomes.

This support has been in appreciation of the spiritual benefits wrought by their shepherd. Father Sullivan has been tireless in caring for the souls intrusted to his care. But one evidence of this is the many long hours he has spent in hearing confessions.

Father Sullivan always enjoys returning to his Alma Mater and he usually makes at least one visit a year. The atmosphere of the early days pervades the college as he relates fond memories of old times and old students.

# Fr. Dalton Tells of Dieppe Raid

Essex Scottish Chaplain-Alumnus Lost 230 of His More Former Students "Military Parish" in Attack on Foe

FROM Captain the Rev. M. J. Dalton, chaplain of the Essex Give Their Lives While Scottish Regiment overseas and prominent alumnus, comes word of the great Allied assault last August 19 on the Nazi-held French coastal town of Dieppe. In his letter, he explains why he was not with his men in the raid-although he had volunteered to go and wanted to be there—and mentions that none of the regiment's officers who were former Assumption students Scottish, died of wounds as a returned from Dieppe.

The letter was written to Father Mallon, editor of Alumni Chatter, in reply to one which he had written to the padre. Father Dalton's letter follows:

### SPEAKS HIGHLY OF A.C.

"I will read your September 6 letter at the Parade Mass on Sunday, at which several Alumni will be bloke remarked: 'A present. Many Protestant Officers ain't no good to us.' and men also speak highly of A. C. and that makes my life (and what is more important, my work) more pleasant and fruitful. Thanks for Masses and prayers for our gallant lads. Two hundred and thirty of my military parish are missing and hundreds of non-Catholics whose frienship I cherished. 'They could take it,' and so must the remnant of three years' total friendship. I who returned struggle on to the end.

Security, didn't know the date. I was visiting a base hospital many miles away when they secretly embarked. None of Essex Scots officers (including several Alumni) returned. ### Msgr. Hackett

RT. REV. JOHN R. HACKETT, V.G., LL.D., Rhetoric '06, Philosophy '08, past president of the Alumni Association, was born in Dowagiac, Mich., 56 years ago. He came to Assumption in September, 1903, and soon established himself as a serious student, class leader and favorite of the staff and stu-

He began the study of theology at St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore after his studies at Assumption and was ordained to the priesthood in Detroit on July 2, 1911, by the late Bishop Foley.

The next six years saw him fill the duties of assistant pastor at St. John the Evangelist, Benton Harbor, St. Peter's, Mt. Clemens and Sacred Heart, Hudson.

His first pastorate was St. Mary's, Manchester, in 1917. With the entrance of his country in World War I, Father Hackett enlisted as chaplain with the rank of lieutenant. His tireless work among the influenza sufferers at Camp Custer nearly made him a victim of the dread disease.

After demobilization, Father Hackett continued at Manchester till 1921 when he became pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, Emmett. From there he transferred to his present pastorate at St. Augustine's, Kalamazoo, in 1923.

The beautiful new school at St. Augustine's is but one example of his zeal for the welfare of his flock. In his gracious and kindly manner, he has been constant in his attention to their spiritual and material needs and also has been a great influence for understanding and harmony in the whole community. In the diocese, of which he is now Vicar-General, he has served as dean and diocesan consultor. The University of Notre Dame bestowed upon our alumnus the degree of Doctor of Laws, hororis causa, and on May 17, 1940, he was raised to the dignity of Domestic Prelate by the Holy Father.

Msgr. Hackett was toastmaster at the Reunion banquet in August and once again his words of wit and wisdom delighted his listeners.

# 'Dead' Alumnus is Prisoner of War

Pte. Raymond Burke's Letter Brings Joy to Family; Assumption Loses Friend Other Alumni Listed Killed, Missing, Captured

A FTER being officially listed on Sept. 21 (see October issue) as March, 1941, received his wings at dead and after a funeral Mass was Belleville and went overseas in sung for the repose of his soul in his parish church on October 1, Pte. Raymond Burke reveals he is very much alive in an enemy prison camp.

Word came to his parents two days after they had mailed cards of thanks to those who had expressed sympathy. The good news came in a letter from Ray himself, written on September 8, which arrived in Windsor October 21.

In Msgr. Laurendeau

One of Best Known Alumni Dies at Age of 66 In Windsor

RIGHT Reverend Francis Xavier Laurendeau, D.P., Dean of Essex, pastor of Our Lady of the Lake Church, Windsor, distinguished alumnus and benefactor died on Sunday, October 18, at the age of sixty-six.

Death came suddenly when it seemed the good Dean of Essex was progressing favourably after injuries suffered in an auto accident. Monsignor Laurendeau served for some vears as an officer of the Alumni Executive and at the time of his death was a director.

Born in Chatham, he came to Assumption in 1896. He was ordained in December 19, 1903. Recently he celebrated his twenty-fifth anniversary as pastor at Our Lady of the Lake.

Other members of this class were Fathers Fred Costello, Ernest DePuydt, John Finn, William Gannon, Frank McQuillan, Louis Moriarty, O.M.I., Thomas O'Rourke, C.S.B., Walter Rottach; Louis McKeon and Joseph Moran.

Following his theological studies at St. Peter's Seminary, London, our alumnus was ordained to the priesthood there in May, 1915. His first appointment took him to St. Thomas but before long he was back in familiar territory, at East Windsor where he served as assistant to Father Laurendeau at Our Lady of the Lake. When in 1926 a division was made of this parish, a new one, Ste. Rose of Riverside, was formed and Father Langlois was appointed its first pastor. For the past sixteen years, he has labored in Riverside and has seen his flock grow into one of the leading parishes of the district. In that time, he has built a fine church and rectory.

The influence of Father Langlois has extended beyond the limits of his parish. For some time he has been chaplain of the 30th Reconnaissance Battalion (Reserve) with the honorary rank of Captain.

Father Langlois has ever been linked to Assumption, its faculty and alumni very closely. It was not surprising, then, that they rejoiced at the new honor conferred upon him on October 23, when his Excellency Bishop Kidd named him Dean of Essex and Pastor of Our Lady of the Lake in succession to the late Monsignor Laurendeau.

The many tributes to our new Dean show that the choice is a very popular one. The Windsor Daily Star expressed the sentiment of the whole community when it extended congratulations editorially.

# One Killed, Two Missing

PO. Albert A. Hebert Dies In Action; Pair Officially Listed "Presumed Dead" By R.C.A.F.; Another Injured

PILOT OFFICER ALBERT A. HEBERT, of the R.C.A.F., was killed on active service on November 9. Bert was 22 years old, the son of alumnus Leonard, '10-'12, and Mrs. Hebert of Riverside. Ont.

The young officer was a High School student at Assumption from 1935 to 1940. From 1940 to 1941 he attended the college as a Pre-Engineer. On July 13, 1941, he enlisted. He trained at Fingal, Ont., Saint John, N.B. and Penfield Ridge, N.S. He was commissioned last July, and a few weeks later went overseas.

Bert was an earnest student and was held in high esteem by his fellow students. He is the 14th former Assumption student to die since the war began. To his bereaved parents, we offer sincere sympathy. R.I.P.

HEBERT, now reported killed in action, a few weeks ago, wrote: "I received two copies of the Alumni news from home last week and I resolved that I would write to you and say how much I appreciated hearing about the old school. I noticed the names of many an old schoolmate of mine who is over here too, but as yet I have failed to run into any of them. It seems funny to me to read of those boys over here doing their bit, and only a very short time ago we were all together at Assumption peacefully playing checkers or chess, and for the most part only showing warlike tendencies about noon hour. But those days are gone forever. Maybe I shouldn't say it to you, Father, but I always figured that I wasn't exceedingly religious, except in streaks, but it's funny how intensely religious one can get in such circumstances as lost over the North Sea or caught in a balloon barrage. I have found out through a few narrow escapes that a few fervent prayers will not only get you back safely, but will also settle your nerves down so that you can work cool and efficiently. As you know I was trained as an air navigator and since my arrival in England have been posted to the Bomber Command. I am at an operational training unit now flying big twin engine machines. It's a far cry from the old Ansons. I expect to be posted to a Canadian four engine bomber squadron soon. We were flying over the French coast the other night and received our baptism of fire. It's amazing to see them firing at you. You don't know whether to be afraid or not. You do get as self-conscious as a sixteen-year-old girl though, and you think that everyone is firing at you personally. The pilot throws the plane into violent evasive action and they are probably firing at someone ten miles away. It's only human nature though and an anti-aircraft battery is a good discurager of accurate flying and bombing if you're not used to them-and I must admit that I am not, yet. Say a prayer for me sometimes, it looks as though I'm going to need it." ### Rev. F. P. White

REV. FRANCIS PAUL WHITE was born on February 11 some years ago at Sombra, Ontario. A few years later the family moved to nearby Courtright where our alumnus was soon to start to school Father White's primary and secondary education was secured in this town. In 1896 he enrolled at the old Detroit College (now the University of Detroit), where he continued till 1899 when he came to Assumption to commence the study of philosophy.

Other members of his class were Fathers Thomas P. Hussey, Francis D. Hill, Jeremiah J. Dantzer, John M. Zindler and Hugh Ryan.

Upon the completion of his philosophical studies in 1901, we find our alumnus studying theology at the Grand Seminary, Montreal. Father White was ordained for the Diocese of London on December 17, 1904. The young priest celebrated his first Mass in St. Charles Church, Courtright.

Father White has ministered to a number of congregations in the Diocese of London, serving first as assistant at St. Peter's Cathedral.

At Port Lambton he erected the parish rectory during his pastorate. Later he was pastor of St. Columban's Church, St. Columban, and it was this post he left to serve as chaplain to the Canadian Army in World War I. Captain White went to France with the Second Division and remained overseas till 1919.

Upon his return to Canada, Father White was named pastor of St. Patrick's, Dublin. In 1926 he succeeded the late Dean Downey as pastor of St. Alphonsus Church, Windsor.

In the midst of his pastoral duties Father White has always kept a close association with his Alma Mater and the Alumni Association. He has always displayed an eagerness to help in their activities. An alumni gathering, a college event finds him among those present.
