THE LONDON VISIT




was followed by the competitive volleyball and basketball games. Victories were decisive since two victories were awarded to each school.


The climax of the evening came when the W.T.C. combo played for the remainder of the night for the dance that followed.

It was a night for both schools to remember and a very enjoyable one indeed.




