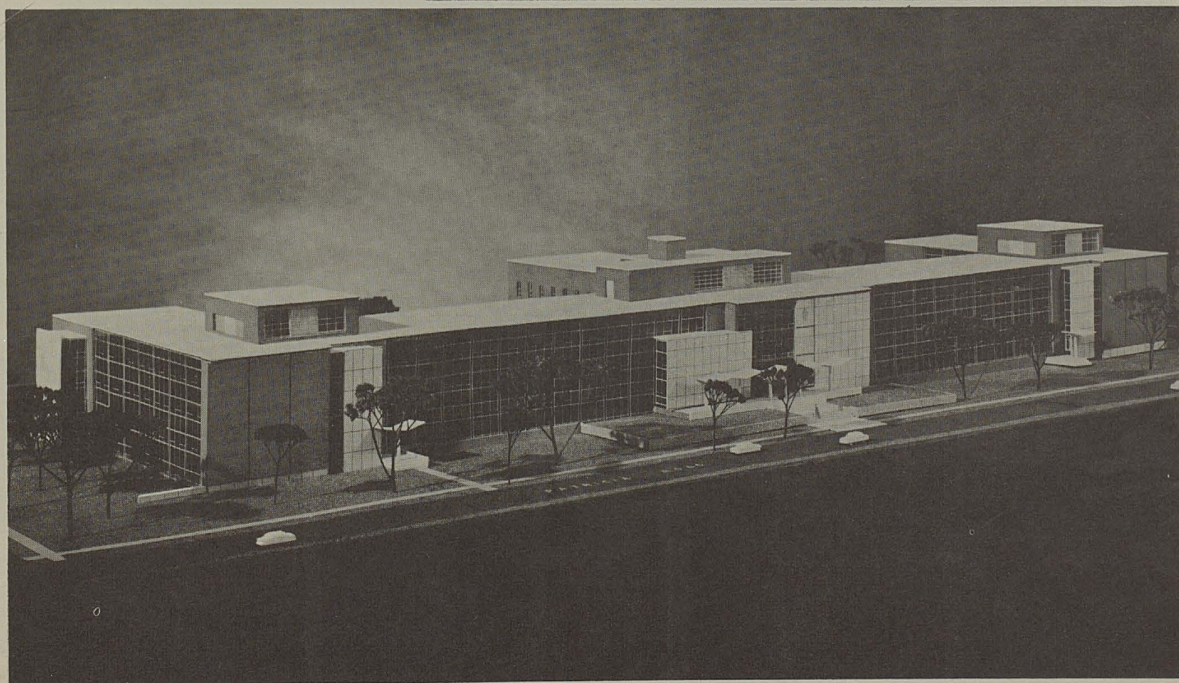
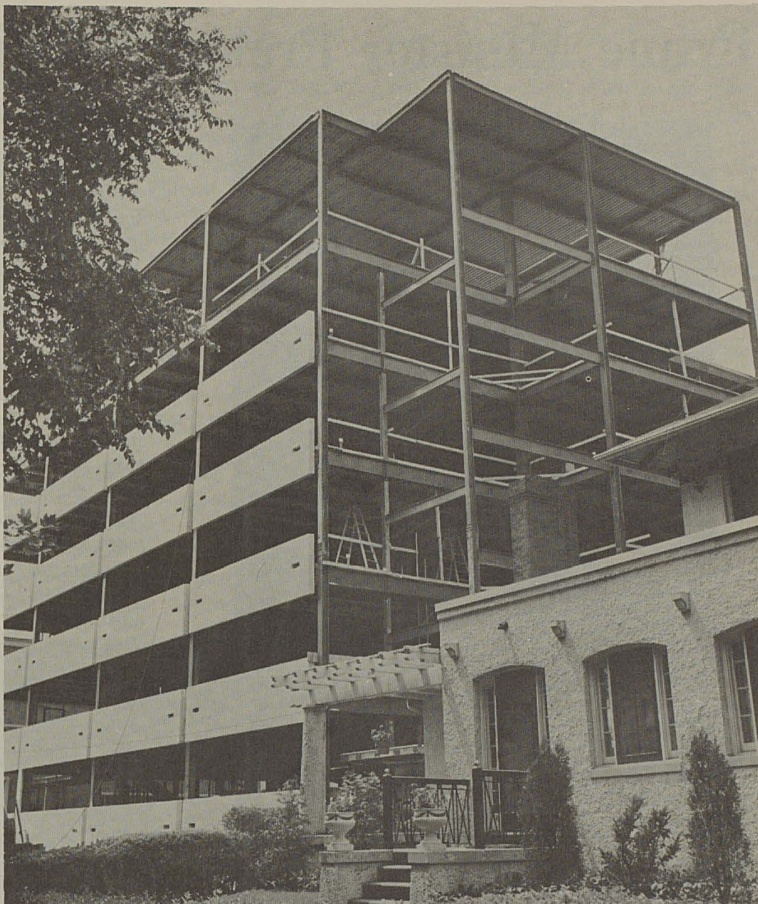

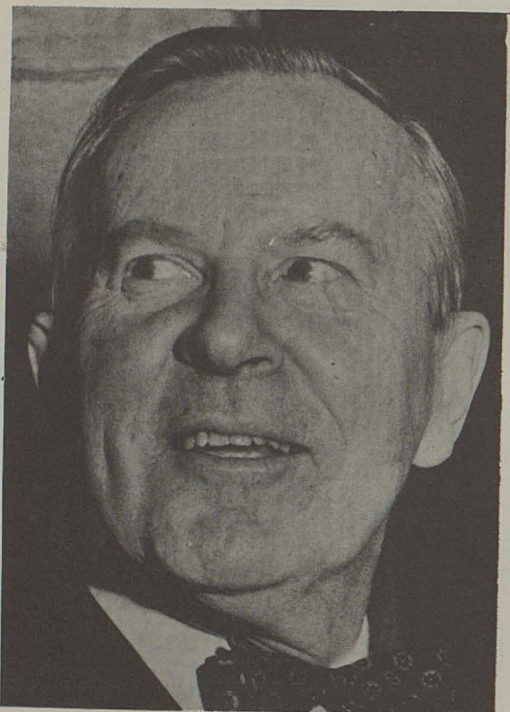
A Campus In Growth

Construction continuing on campus during the summer, and amounting to more than \$4,000,000, includes Phase II of the Engineering building, which, when completed, will become known as the Pure and Applied Sciences Building. Photo at bottom of this page shows the architect's model of the Pure and Applied Science Building. Under construction at present is the \$3,000,000 physics and chemistry wing, which, in the photo, shows as the "L" shaped wing on the extreme *right*. Steel work has been completed and the University has awarded completion of the building contract to Eastern Construction Company Ltd., of Windsor. The addition is expected to open a year from now. Architects are Pennington and Carter, of Windsor.

Construction is also progressing rapidly on the addition to Electa Hall, formerly Holy Names College, which is expected to be opened this fall. Photo at right shows the steel structure completed.



Prime Minister Praises Basilian Fathers . . .



(The following is an excerpt from the Convocation address given by Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.)

The stature of any university is based on its moral and intellectual purpose and its teaching prowess. But there is something more, something in the particular spirit and traditions of a university, that gives it a special quality and a place in the hearts of its alumni.

* * *

The spirit of a university can never be created in isolation from the community from which it draws its students. The importance of leadership is, however, very great. I am not now referring to individual leadership, significant though that can be. It is the leadership provided by the common spirit of a group of men that above all moulds the character of a university. The quality which I know we will see in the University of Windsor has its origin in the exceptionally liberal tradition of the Basilian Fathers in your community.

One of the great marks of distinction which Assumption University has earned lies in the way in which, as a Catholic institution, its doors have been open to students and to teachers of other beliefs.

That liberal tradition has inspired the Christian Culture series of public lectures, which have been conducted by Assumption in Windsor and Detroit for more than a quarter of a century. That series has provided a welcome to lecturers of distinction in ideas and ideals whether they are Catholic, Protestant or Jewish.

The same tradition was at work here when, in 1957, Canterbury College, under the sponsorship of the Anglican Church, became affiliated with the university. Such an affiliation between Catholic and Anglican institutions had never happened before anywhere in the world, so far as I know, during all the centuries since the Reformation.

The same tradition made possible also the creation of the non-denominational Essex College, whose faculty, buildings and equipment are now being absorbed in the University of Windsor.

This liberal educational tradition is now inspiring a new departure in the field of religious education which has an interesting antecedent in my Alma Mater. More than half a century ago, the University of Toronto became the first Canadian university where the teaching of religious knowledge was allocated to denominational colleges in a federated university supported by provincial government funds. That was, in our time, a new recognition of the position of theology as the mother of moral and academic disciplines. Now, at the University of Windsor, you are going a step further by establishing a central department of religious knowledge in which all faiths are assured the right to study and teach theology with freedom for each and embarrassment to none.

That is an especially appropriate development in a university which had large numbers of non-Catholic students even before its newer colleges were created; and which draws significant numbers of students from so many parts of the world — from the United States, from Central and South America, from the Orient and from Africa.

Your international flavour leads me to mention also the annual Seminar on Canadian-American Relations, which I have been delighted to attend. There are few more important studies in international relationships than the way in which a small nation can live, in close co-operation but with its own separate and independent identity, as the neighbour of the vast super-power with which it shares a continent. Your Seminar, serving as a forum to explore problems and promote new ideas about better co-operation on the basis of mutual understanding and respect, is a most valuable institution which will, I am sure, flourish and become of still greater importance.

The tasks of education are critical to our age. They need to be faced with courage, with breadth of vision and depth of understanding, with liberality of mind and spirit. "To see life steady and see it whole" is an injunction to the teacher and to the student that becomes more important with the ever-increasing complexity of our civilization. I am sure that my fellow honorary doctors join me in congratulating Assumption University, and now the University of Windsor, on the tradition in which you undertake the tasks of education and, equally important, the spirit in which you provide for the enrichment and expansion of the mind that is the glory of education.

Assumption's Spring Convocation

Canada's fourteenth prime minister, a former president of Assumption College and a leading Canadian industrialist received honorary degrees at Assumption University's 19th and final spring convocation June 1 at which Most Rev. John C. Cody, Bishop of London and chancellor of the University, bestowed a record

348 degrees, diplomas and certificates.

An estimated 2,000 persons, seated in chairs on the lawn in front of University Centre, watched as Hon. Lester B. Pearson, Canada's prime minister, Rev. Vincent J. Guinan, C.S.B., former president of Assumption College, and Harry J. Carmichael, C.M.G., a St. Catharines, Ontario, industrialist received honorary doctor of laws degrees.

It was Assumption's last spring convocation. On July 1, the University merged with the new corporation, the University of Windsor. Assumption will, however, hold its 20th convocation this fall for students completing their graduation programs this summer.

The largest graduation class in Assumption's history represented an increase of twenty per cent over the

number graduating in the spring of 1962. They included nine masters of arts, six masters of science, one master of applied science, three masters of business administration, eleven honours bachelors of arts, one hundred and eighty bachelors of arts, seven honours bachelors of science, thirty-three bachelors of science, twenty-three bachelors of applied science, twelve honours bachelors of commerce, two bachelors of commerce, four bachelors of sacred theology, ten bachelors of science in nursing, nine diplomas in nursing education, four diplomas in nursing service administration, fifteen diplomas in public health nursing, two diplomas in management and seventeen certificates in business administration.

Mr. Pearson, a graduate of the University of Toronto, received his master of arts degree from Oxford

University. He has received honorary degrees from twenty-seven other universities, including Oxford, Harvard, Yale, Dartmouth, Ceylon and Toronto. In 1957, after a long and distinguished career as a Canadian and world statesman, he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. In 1958, he left his career as statesman to become leader of the Canadian Liberal Party and in April, 1963, was elected prime minister of Canada.

Father Guinan, a graduate of Assumption College in 1920, received

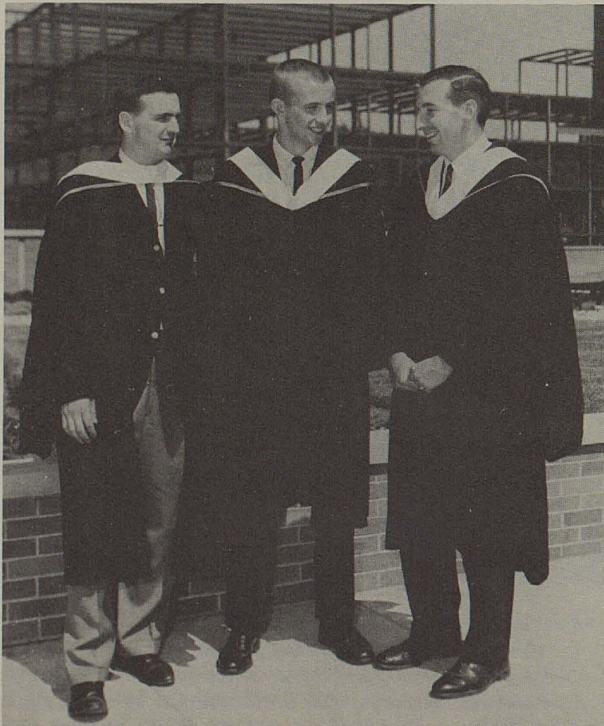
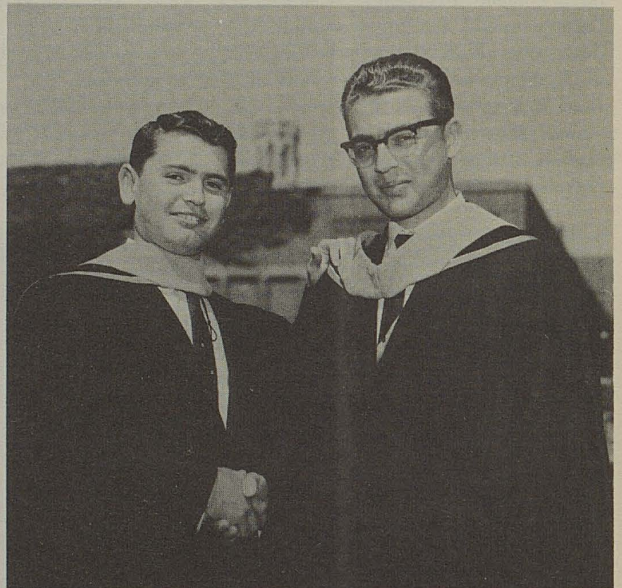
his master of arts degree from the University of Ottawa. In 1924, he returned to Assumption where he was successively professor of philosophy, registrar, vice-president and, from 1940 until 1946, president. In 1946 Father Guinan left Assumption to found the University of St. Thomas in Houston, Texas, of which he was president until 1959. In that year, he was named president emeritus of the University of St. Thomas.

Mr. Carmichael, vice-president and director of Conroy Manufacturing

Co. Ltd., and also of the Toronto Dominion Bank, is a director of at least fourteen other Canadian companies. A former vice-president and general manager of General Motors of Canada Ltd., he was director general of gun production, co-ordinator of production, and president of War Supplies Ltd. during the Second World War. For these and other services, he was awarded the U.S. Medal of Freedom and appointed by Queen Elizabeth a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

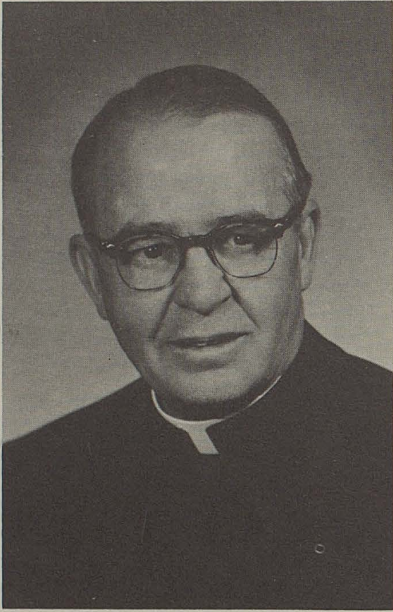
*With A Rich
And Noble
Tradition
. . . . A New
University
Is Born*

■ With little outward show, the University of Windsor, Canada's newest university — formed through the merger of Assumption University of Windsor and its affiliates, Essex, Canterbury and Holy Redeemer colleges — took possession July 1 of a campus with more than a century of historical and academic traditions. Indeed, on its very birth day, the University of Windsor's faculty and staff were hard at work registering students for summer school which began the following day.

The facility of change-over was a striking tribute to the labor and cooperative spirit of volunteer laymen, faculty and administrative staff of all five institutions. Since December 20, 1962, when the Ontario Legislature passed the University of Windsor Act, the new university's board of governors was working quietly and diligently in preparation for the change. Senior administrative and academic appointments were made (see the following pages); arrangements for the transfer of property and buildings to the University of Windsor were completed; the Senate approved academic offerings for the coming year; negotiations for affiliation agreements for Canterbury and Holy Redeemer colleges are well under way; and the board of governors has announced the first major building project of the new university, a combined lecture rooms and administrative offices building, scheduled to be started before the end of 1963.

It is a far cry from February 10, 1857, when the first few students entered the first class of Le College de l'Assomption. But the same forward looking spirit which sparked the beginning of the small college by the Detroit River has now begot the University of Windsor. On July 1, Hon. Lester B. Pearson, Canada's prime minister, sent a letter to the University of Windsor which said in part:

"The University of Windsor is entering the academic world, not with a character to create for itself, but with the heritage of a rich and noble tradition created and developed by its predecessor and continuing partner, Assumption University." ■

1963-64**

Rev. Eugene Carlisle LeBel, C.S.B., C.D., M.A., LL.D., first president and founder of Assumption University of Windsor (1953), who was appointed first president of the University of Windsor in February, 1963, will retire on June 30, 1964. At the announcement of his retirement, Father LeBel explained that he had accepted the appointment as president of the University of Windsor on the condition that a successor would be sought to take his place when he reaches the retirement age of 65 next year. Only two other Canadian university presidents now in office have had longer service. Father LeBel, born in Sarnia, received his bachelor of arts degree in honours history and English from St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, and his master of arts degree from the University of Chicago. In 1941, after teaching at St. Michael's College and at St. Thomas More College, of the University of Saskatchewan, Father LeBel came to Assumption College as head of the English department. In 1947 he was appointed dean and in 1952 was appointed superior of the Basilian Fathers at Assumption and president of Assumption College. He was chiefly responsible for Assumption College receiving its University charter in 1953 and for the world-acclaimed affiliation of the Anglican Canterbury College with Assumption in 1957. In 1961, the year he received the Windsor Brotherhood Week award, Father LeBel was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree by the University of Western Ontario. He is a director of the Canadian Universities Foundation, the executive body of the National Conference of Canadian Universities and Colleges.

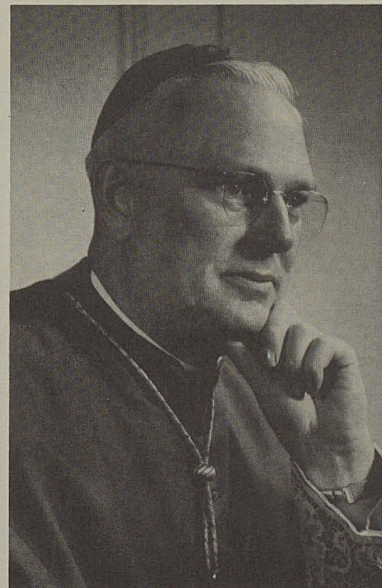
John J. Stuart, B. Comm., president, J. T. Wing and Company Limited, Windsor, is chairman of the board of governors, University of Windsor. Born in Windsor, Mr. Stuart attended Windsor (Patterson) Collegiate Institute and McGill University School of Business Administration from which he graduated in 1935. He joined the Royal Bank of Canada as a clerk and was junior inspector at provincial head office when he left the bank in 1938 to become director and secretary of J. T. Wing and Company Limited. He became vice-president of the company in 1949 and president in 1963. Mr. Stuart is a former member of the executive committee, Canadian Chamber of Commerce, former president, Ontario Chamber of Commerce, former president, Windsor Chamber of Commerce, a director of Beaver Insurance Company, Toronto, a member of the Windsor advisory board of Huron and Erie Mortgage Corporation, and an elder at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Windsor, Ontario.

Dr. Francis Leddy, D.Phil., D.Litt., D. esL., LL.D., D.C.L., who becomes president of the University of Windsor July 1, 1964, is an honorary alumnus of Assumption University, having been awarded a doctor of laws degree by Assumption in 1956. He is currently head of the department of classics, dean of arts and science and academic vice-president of the University of Saskatchewan. Born in Ottawa, Dr. Leddy received his bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from the University of Saskatchewan, his bachelor of literature and his doctor of philosophy (as a Rhodes scholar) from Exeter College, Oxford University. He has been chairman of the Educational Council of the Province of Saskatchewan since 1945, and is national chairman of the World University Service of Canada, of the Canadian University Service Overseas, and of the Saskatchewan selection committee for Rhodes scholarships. He is a member of the national selection committee of the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowships Foundation. In recent years, he has been president or chairman of the Canadian National Commission for UNESCO, the Humanities Research Council of Canada, the Classical Association of Canada, the Canadian Association of Rhodes Scholars, the Canadian Catholic Historical Association and the Saskatoon branch of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs. In 1953 he received the Human Relations Award of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews. He has also received the papal medal, Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice. He is a Knight of Malta and a Knight of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem.

Most Rev. John C. Cody, D.D., LL.D., Bishop of London and chancellor of Assumption University, has been appointed chancellor of the University of Windsor. Born in Ottawa, Bishop Cody attended St. Alexander's College, Ironside, Ont., the Seminary of Philosophy, Montreal, and the Grand Seminary, Ottawa, before ordination as a priest in 1923. He served as assistant pastor at St. Patrick's Church, Ottawa, and was pastor at St. Declan's, Brightside, Ont., St. Elizabeth's, Cantley, P.Q., and Assumption, Eastview, Ont. He was consecrated Bishop of Victoria, British Columbia, in 1937, at the age of 38, at that time the youngest Roman Catholic bishop in Canada. In 1946 he became coadjutor Bishop of London and in 1950 was appointed Bishop of London. In 1953 he became chancellor of Assumption University of Windsor. For his exceptional and "marked interest" in education, Bishop Cody was awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree by the University of Western Ontario.

University of Windsor Key Appointments

Dr. Frank A. DeMarco, principal of Essex College and dean of applied science, has been appointed vice-president of the University of Windsor.

Born in Podargoni, Italy, Dr. DeMarco received primary and secondary education in North Bay, Ont., and entered the University of Toronto in 1938 on scholarship. He received both his bachelor of applied science and doctor of philosophy degrees from the University of Toronto and instructed at that university. In 1946, Dr. DeMarco joined the chemistry department of Assumption College, rising from assistant professor to professor and head of that department. From 1949 until 1955, he was also director of athletics.

With the establishment in 1956 of Essex College, Dr. DeMarco became chairman of the college's staff committee. In 1957 he was made acting head of the engineering department and, in April, 1959, he was appointed principal of Essex College and dean of the faculty of applied science.

Robert A. Nairn, B.A., comptroller and secretary-treasurer, Essex College, has been appointed secretary-treasurer of the University of Windsor.

Born in Edinburgh, Scotland, Mr. Nairn received his primary and secondary schooling in Fort William, Ont., and his bachelor of arts degree in honours business administration from the University of Western Ontario in London. He was employed in the accounting department of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, becoming supervisor of general accounting before he left in 1957 to become business administrator for the Chatham, Ont., board of education. In 1958, he became assistant business administrator of Essex College and, in 1960, was appointed secretary-treasurer of Essex College.

C. William Morgan, B.Sc., superintendent of buildings and grounds for Assumption, has been appointed director of engineering services for the University of Windsor. Born in Windsor, Mr. Morgan received his bachelor of applied science in civil

engineering from Queen's University, Kingston. He was building commissioner for the City of Windsor until 1957 when he came to Assumption.

John E. Thompson, B.A., M.C., director of development and public relations at Assumption, has been appointed executive assistant to the president. A graduate of the University of Manitoba, Mr. Thompson is a former newspaper and magazine reporter and editor in Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal, New York, London and Berlin and former Canadian editor of Newsweek magazine.

Joseph E. Schiller, B.A., accountant at Assumption University, has been appointed accountant for the University of Windsor. Born in Windsor, Mr. Schiller attended Assumption High School and Assumption College, graduating in 1948 with a bachelor of arts degree. He was employed by Zenith Radio Corp. of Canada and Ford Motor Company of Canada Ltd. before coming to Assumption as accountant in 1958.

Miss Barbara H. Birch, M.A., registrar at Assumption, has been appointed registrar at the University of Windsor. Born in Windsor, Miss Birch graduated from St. Mary's Academy and Holy Names College, receiving her bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from Assumption College. She was secretary to the principal of Assumption High School before joining the registrar's office at Assumption College in 1952. In 1953 she was appointed assistant registrar and in August, 1961, was appointed registrar.

William F. Dollar, M.A., A.M.L.S., librarian at Assumption, has been appointed librarian at the University of Windsor. A graduate of Assumption College in 1951, Mr. Dollar received his master of arts degree in library science from the University of Michigan before joining the library staff in 1953. In 1957 he became assistant librarian and in 1960 was appointed librarian.

Herbert E. Wilshire, M.S., director of University Centre at Assumption, has been appointed director of stu-

dent affairs. Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., Mr. Wilshire received his bachelor of science and master of science degrees in education from State University College of Education, Brockport, N.Y., where he later was director of college union and residence halls. He came to Assumption in 1961.

Miss Evelyn G. MacLean, B.A., dean of women at Assumption, has been appointed assistant director of student affairs (women) and *R. Paul Gilmor*, B.A., director of men's residence at Assumption, has been appointed assistant director of student affairs (men).

Miss MacLean received her bachelor of arts degree from Assumption University in 1958, joining the staff of the registrar's office the same year. In 1962, Miss MacLean was appointed assistant registrar and early in 1963 was appointed dean of women.

A graduate of Assumption College in 1948, Mr. Tolmie was employed in the accounting department, Canadian General Electric, and was later administrative assistant to the secretary, Chrysler Corporation of Canada, before joining the staff of Junior Achievement of Windsor, Inc.

R. K. LITTLE HEADS ALUMNI ANNUAL FUND

A proposal that the goal for the 1963 Alumni Fund be 30 per cent participation by alumni will be made to the fund advisory council when it meets early in August by Robert K. Little, '50, fund chairman.

Re-appointment of Mr. Little as fund chairman was announced recently by Arthur B. Weingarden, '54, president of the University of Windsor Alumni Association.

The funds have been used by the University to provide scholarships for Canadian and American students. There are currently more than 40 students studying under alumni-supported scholarships.

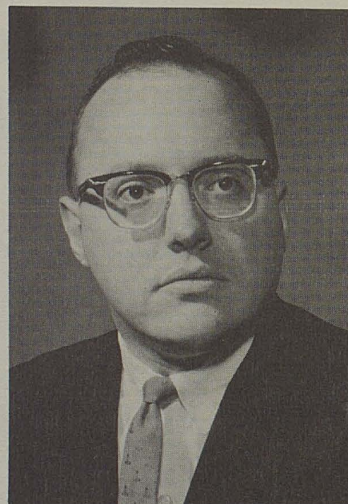
Windsor-Detroit Remain Together As Un. Chapter

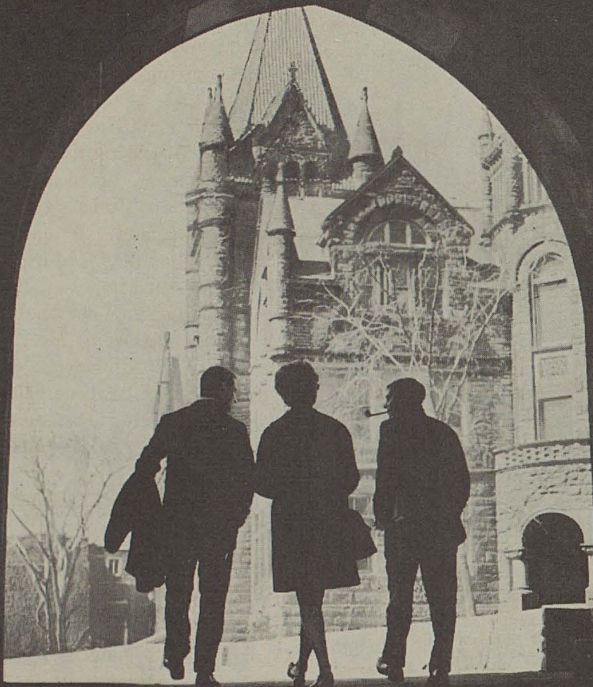

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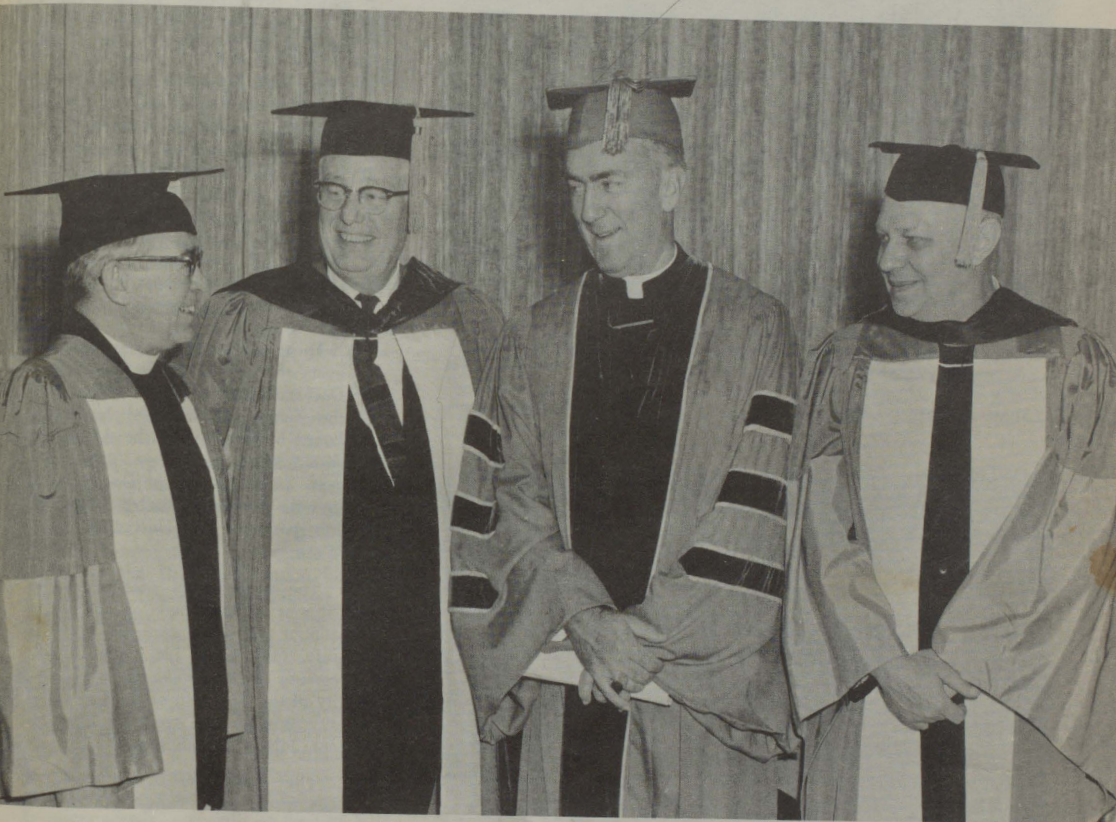

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EDITOR'S CORNER

As promised last edition, the special feature report on The University of Windsor Alumni Association appears on pages six and seven, with current alumni news and additional small feature stories on some aspects of alumni activity.

This column I've reserved to emphasize several aspects of the alumni organization which seem to be unclear in the minds of many alumni I've spoken with.

One such aspect, for instance, is the fact we have two alumni representatives on the University's Board of Governors. Currently serving are Joseph R. Deane, a graduate of 1948, and James A. Holden, class of '33. Another aspect is that we have two alumni serving on the Senate, currently Ray Pollard, class of '39, and Allan T. J. Roach, class of '46.

These representatives, appointed every three years to the Board of Governors and every two years to the Senate, are selected by the board of directors of the Alumni Association. They are ensured seats on the Board of Governors and the Senate by the Act which incorporated the University of Windsor.

The third aspect concerns the Alumni Office, made up of the alumni secretary and his secretary, Miss Carol Lee Latter and coming directly under the authority of the President of the University through his executive assistant, John E. Thompson.

The alumni office is central headquarters for former students, a place to direct questions, criticisms and suggestions about the alumni or the University. The office is included in the overall budget of the University, is responsible for liaison with alumni personally, through chapter organizations, and through the quarterly publication of Alumni Times.

The first two doctor of philosophy degrees ever to be awarded by Assumption University of Windsor were conferred Oct. 17 as Assumption held its final Convocation in University Centre auditorium.

Recipients of doctoral degrees in chemistry were Joseph E. Clark, of Philadelphia, whose research was in thermal breakdown of high polymers, and Roy Shilton, born in Tottington, Bury, Lancs., England, whose research was in silicon compounds. Dr. Shilton received his degree "with honours".

Honorary degrees of doctor of laws were conferred on Dr. Clarence B. Hilberry, president of Wayne State University, and Very Rev. Joseph Charles Wey, C.S.B., superior general of the Basilian Fathers.

Most Rev. G. Emmett Carter, auxiliary bishop of London and pro-chancellor of the University of Windsor, conferred two masters of arts degrees, six masters of science, three masters of applied science, one master of business administration, forty-seven bachelors of arts, seven bachelors of applied science, four bachelors of science, two bachelors of commerce, one bachelor of science in nursing, two certificates in business administration, and a diploma in each of nursing education, nursing service administration, and public health nursing.

Three of the four Board of Governors' gold medals awarded at Convocation went to students who entered the University on scholarships sponsored by donations to the Alumni Annual Fund. They are: Miss Henriette Zakon, first year winner; William White, second year winner; and Francis Lemire, third year winner.

It was the final Convocation held by Assumption University of Windsor which federated July 1 with the University of Windsor. Henceforth Assumption University will confer degrees only in the faculty of graduate theology.

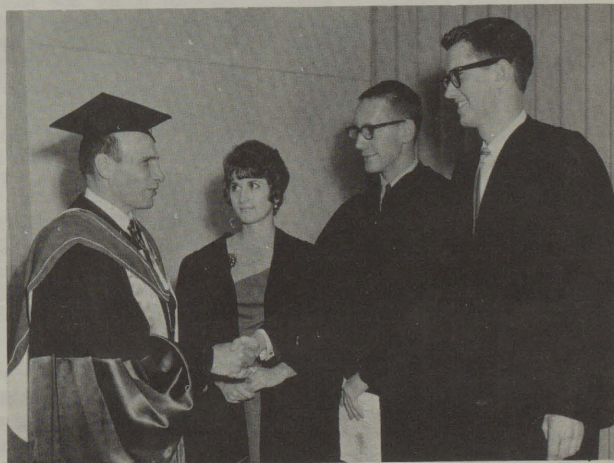
Dr. Hilberry, who gave the Convocation address, said he and others at Wayne State University had watched with admiration the growth of Assumption University. He predicted the University of Windsor would progress greatly, especially so because it is starting by awarding doctoral degrees.

Bishop Carter said the final Convocation of Assumption University should not be considered as the closing of the door of Assumption but as the opening of the door of the University of Windsor. "Assumption University is taking on a wider and deeper life by belonging in a fuller sense to the whole community," Bishop Carter said.

FACULTY NUMBERS 146

Total number of full-time teachers at the University of Windsor numbers 146, an increase of 23 over the number of faculty employed last year by Assumption University. Included in the increase are the appointments of three visiting professors, two in English and one in mechanical engineering.

Dr. Itrat-Husain Zuberi, fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, and seventeenth century English scholar, has been appointed visiting professor of English. Born in Meerut, India, Dr. Zuberi received his master of arts from St. John's College, India, and his doctor of philosophy from Edinburgh University, Scotland. He was senior professor of English at Islamia College, Calcutta; Carnegie research fellow at Merton College, Oxford; professor of English at Dacca University, Pakistan; visiting professor and later professor of English at Iowa State University; and visiting professor at Claremont University College. In addition, Dr. Zuberi was vice-chancellor of Rajshahi University, Pakistan; an elected member of the executive board of UNESCO, Paris; and an elected member of the executive committee of the Association of Universities of the British Commonwealth. He has published several books on seventeenth century English and is currently preparing two more, one of them on Shakespeare, under the pen-name of Itrat-Husain.

Dr. George B. Harrison, retired professor of English at the University of Michigan, author, editor and critic of Shakespearean literature, has been appointed visiting professor of English, commencing Jan. 1, 1964. A graduate of Brighton College, England, and Queen's College, Cambridge, Dr. Harrison received his Ph.D. from the University of London. He taught at King's College, University of London, and Queen's University, Kingston, before joining the College of Literature, Science and Arts at the University of Michigan.

During World War I, Dr. Harrison was a British Army captain in India and Mesopotamia, and, in World War II, he served with the Royal Army Service Corps and Intelligence Corps in the British Isles. In 1952, he was the editor of the complete works of Shakespeare, published by Harcourt Brace, New York.

Dr. Nicholas Rosenauer, senior lecturer in applied mechanics at the University of New South Wales, Sydney, Australia, has been appointed visiting professor of mechanical engineering. Born in Jelgava, Latvia, Dr. Rosenauer received what is the equivalent of a master of civil and mechanical engineering degree from Technical University of Emperor Alexander I, in St. Petersburg, and his doctor of engineering degree from the University of Latvia, Riga, Latvia. From 1915 until 1922, he was engaged in bridge and railway construction in Russia. Since then he has taught at the University of Latvia and the University of New South Wales. He has published more than 45 articles in learned periodicals and a book on "Kinematics of Mechanisms."

FIVE ALUMNI AMONG NEW FACULTY

Included in the new faculty appointments are six former students of Assumption University of Windsor. Rev. John R. Dougherty, C.S.B., '51, has been appointed assistant professor of biology; John Paul Labute, '60, has been appointed lecturer in mathematics; Mrs. John Paul Labute, the former Tamara Zakon, '61, has been appointed lecturer in mathematics; James Laframboise, '57, has been appointed assistant professor of mathematics; G. R. Monforton, '61, has been appointed lecturer in civil engineering; and Guy B. Sullivan, '55, has been appointed lecturer in business administration.

DIRECTOR OF RESIDENCES

Rev. E. A. Roberts, C.S.B., who continues as treasurer of Assumption University, has been appointed director of residences. (Under agreement, Assumption continues to operate the residences at the University of Windsor). Assisting Father Roberts are

two alumni: Miss Barbara Craig, '56, as director of women's residences; and John Devan, '62, as director of men's residences.

ALEX PAVLINI MEMORIAL AWARD

Contributions from friends and radio listeners to the Alex Pavlini Memorial Award fund, established in honour of Mr. Pavlini, '58, noted radio announcer who was killed in a car accident this summer, total more than \$2,100 to date. The fund will be used to provide an annual \$200 bursary to a student in the faculty of arts and science, preferably one who has participated in radio or dramatic activities at the University. The trust fund committee is headed by Kenneth A. Murray, general manager of CBE Radio (Windsor), where Mr. Pavlini was employed.

LANGUAGE LAB EXPANDED

The University's language laboratory has been expanded to accommodate 60 students and re-designed to provide each booth with its own tape recorder and play-back system. A library of tapes has been set up adjacent to the laboratory, located on the second floor of Dillon Hall. Cost of the new equipment totaled \$40,000.

RESEARCH GRANT

Dr. H. H. G. Jelinek, professor of chemistry, has received a \$2,500 grant from Dow Chemical of Canada Ltd. in support of his research into polymers.

GREGORIAN INSTITUTE

The Gregorian Institute of America, in co-operation with the University of Windsor, will inaugurate an International Summer School of Liturgical and Church Music at the University next August. The school, to include for the first time in the Institute's history an inter-denominational program, will be conducted annually during the last two weeks of August with next year's sessions scheduled from Aug. 17 until Aug. 28.

CHRISTIAN CULTURE SERIES

In its 30th season, the Christian Culture Series presents a series of nineteen diversified programs. Bishop

Can - Am Seminar

The Fifth Annual Seminar on Canadian-American Relations will be held in University Centre Nov. 7, 8 and 9, with more than 30 outstanding Canadian and American leaders on hand to speak or take part in discussions. Seminar director, Rev. Frank J. Boland, C.S.B., who is also associate professor of history, said the number of speakers for the three-day forum has been cut down from last year to permit more participation by the audiences and more discussion among the participating speakers.

Michigan Governor George P. Romney will deliver the Seminar's keynote address at a luncheon Nov. 7 in University Centre. Hon. Paul Martin, Canada's minister of external affairs is scheduled to speak at the dinner meeting Nov. 7. A representative of the United States government is also expected to share in the spotlight that night with Mr. Martin.

An innovation in the Seminar is the scheduling of an all-students' panel whose topic this year is on the Quebec separatist movement and the Negro problem in the U.S. William White, president of the students' administrative council, will be chairman of the panel.

Theme of the Seminar is "North American Solidarity and Domestic Problems." "The separatist movement in Canada and the Negro problem in the States seem to be the chief domestic problems during 1963," Father Boland said. "Speakers will be attacking the question of solidarity from many viewpoints, but I think you can say we will be trying to discover the deterrents to American solidarity. I think one of the problems, for instance, is communications. I don't mean so much the communications media — radio, television and the press — but the basic sociological differences. For example, why would an American invest in risk stocks and a Canadian only in government bonds?"

The Seminar has since its inauguration been closely watched by diplomatic representatives of foreign embassies seeking an insight into future policies on various matters by both Canada and the United States. "They consider the Seminar a sounding board," says Father Boland. "Some of the speeches in the past have indicated policy that the government intends to follow."

Included in the topics and the speakers listing are:

"Do American Subsidiary Firms Make Good Canadian Citizens?" with Richard Graybiel, general manager, The Windsor Star, as chairman, and panel members: Edward Cole, vice-president in charge of car and truck division, General Motors, Detroit; Herbert Lank, president, DuPont of Canada, Montreal; Hon. Robert Macaulay, Q.C., former minister of economics and development for the Ontario government; Frank Sherk, executive vice-president, U.S.A. operations, Heinz Co., Pittsburgh; and Dr. Richard Yohe, president, B. F. Goodrich of Canada, Kitchener, Ont.

"Defence, North American Solidarity," with General Lester Bork, president, Detroit Economics Club, as chairman, and panel members: Air Vice-Marshal Clare Annis, Ottawa; Arnold Heeney, former Canadian Ambassador to the United States; and Rufus Smith, American Embassy, Ottawa.

"Biculturalism — North American Solidarity (American, Canadian Views on Present Separatist Movement in Quebec)," with Dr. Ross Tolmie, Q.C., Ottawa, as chairman, and panel members: Dr. Rudolph Helling, University of Windsor; Premier Louis Robichaud, New Brunswick; Maurice Sauve, Chairman of the Defence Committee, House of Commons, Ottawa; and Professor Mason Wade, University of Rochester.

The Alumni Association

Students from a considerable distance coming for the first time to the University are understandably eager to know about the University's traditions and about the social and cultural life of the University. So are their parents.

In Rochester, N.Y., a few years ago, alumni held a tea and garden party in September for prospective students and their parents. The idea was to allay any anxieties by telling parents and students about the University, answering questions, and, indeed, standing as examples of former students, now alumni.

The success of that Rochester tea party was overwhelming. Parents and students were happy to ask questions and hear more about the University.

The story of the University of Windsor Alumni Association begins with the story of the Rochester tea party because it is a good example of a service the alumni can provide not only to spread the good will of their Alma Mater but to be of service to their own community.

The University of Windsor Alumni Association, incorporated by the Act of the Ontario Legislature which incorporated the University of Windsor, traces its beginnings, as does the University, to Assumption College and later Assumption University of Windsor.

Formed by alumni decades ago, its aim has been and still is to promote the interests of the University and to establish and maintain mutually beneficial relations between the University and its alumni.

To be a good alumnus is to have integrity, to be virtuous and to be intelligently informed. These descriptives are poor substitutes for what we all know as our Alma Mater's motto: "Teach me Goodness, Discipline and Knowledge."

Terry Mulligan, president of the Toronto alumni chapter and who is originally from Niagara Falls, Ont., told Toronto alumni last winter that one of the best purposes for an alumni chapter in addition to serving the University is to give a warm welcome to newcomers to a community.

In the University chapter (made up of alumni from Windsor and Detroit), a number of alumni give hour after hour of their time to coaching intra-mural football and hockey on campus.

A traditional annual event in Montreal is to hold a meeting when the Lancers play the McGill Redmen on the Montreal University's basketball floor, attending the game and meeting with coaches and players afterwards.

Last year when the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union decided to hold its first dominion-wide Canadian Basketball championships (held at the University), the Alumni Association supported the sponsors with a gift of a costly trophy, named after one of Assumption's all-time sporting greats, Rev. W. P. McGee.

Many alumni have encouraged students to go on to higher education—either here or elsewhere—thereby helping not only the student but the community as well. Encouraging good students to attend Alma Mater is one of the greatest alumni activities.

Collectively, as a chapter, or individually, alumni can also provide encouragement to students at University. A year ago, the University chapter sponsored a dinner for students attending the University on alumni scholarships.

The Alumni Association Board of Directors, which manages the affairs of the Alumni Association, consists of nine board members, three elected each year, and four executive officers elected at the annual meeting at Homecoming. In addition, the University of Windsor is represented by its president or his appointee. The alumni secretary, as secretary-treasurer, is another ex-officio member.

Included among the board's functions are: Appointing two members every three years to represent the alumni on the University's ruling board, the Board of Governors; appointing two alumni every two years to serve on the academic ruling body,

the University's Senate; and appointing and overseeing its standing and special committees, such as Homecoming Committee, Chapter Activities Committee and the Alumni Annual Fund Advisory Council.

Separate from the Alumni Association board of directors, but working for the same causes, are alumni chapters. These are formed in communities where the number and interest of alumni warrants.

There are some communities at present with more than enough alumni to form a chapter, but the desire is lacking. There are some where the desire is present, but the number of alumni lacking.

At time of writing, alumni in Tilbury, Chatham and London have expressed a decided desire to form alumni chapters in their communities. Chapters now existing include those in Toronto, Montreal, Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie and the University Chapter in Windsor-Detroit.

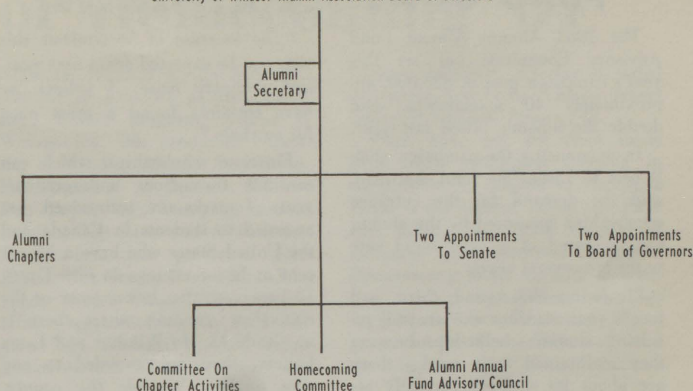
The functions of chapters vary from chapter to chapter. In the University Chapter, several meetings are held each year (see next page for a list of this chapter's activities for the 1963-64 year); Toronto meets several times a year. Alumni in Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie hold annual meetings.

To at least one meeting a year, a senior official of the University is invited to talk on the development of the University in the last year and to answer questions from the alumni in the chapter. Other meetings, if they are held, are held for reasons peculiar to the particular chapter. Examples of these were mentioned earlier.

Membership in the Alumni Association is automatic, providing a student has completed one year at the University. Most alumni, however, have completed either preliminary courses here or have been graduated.

An active alumnus is one who, according to the Association's revised constitution, is in contact at least once each year with the alumni secretary or one who makes a contribution to the Alumni Annual Fund.

University of Windsor Alumni Association Board of Directors



This chart sketches a general outline of the University of Windsor Alumni Association's organization. Two executive officers and three board members are each year elected to the board of directors at the annual meeting of the alumni (usually held in conjunction with Homecoming). The alumni secretary acts as the secretary-treasurer of the board. Its standing committees include the Homecoming committee, the chapter activities committee and the Alumni Annual Fund Advisory Council. As shown at right, the board of directors appoints two alumni every two years to the University's Senate and two alumni every three years to the University's Board of Governors. The alumni chapters, shown on chart at left, elect their own officers to manage the affairs of the chapters. From the University's standpoint, the Alumni Association comes under the direct attention of the President, and ex-officio member of the alumni board.

The Alumni Annual Fund was started by the Alumni Association in 1958 as a means of aiding the development of the University. For the last several years, the Board of Governors has put the funds to use in providing scholarships.

FUND GOAL SET AT \$20,000

The 1963 Alumni Annual Fund Advisory Committee has set this year's campaign goal at \$20,000, approximately 40 scholarships, and double the amount raised last year.

In announcing the campaign goal, Robert K. Little, '50, fund chairman, said the demand for the entrance scholarships sponsored by the alumni has increased at a very rapid rate in the last several years.

"Including the second, third, and fourth year students who are still receiving alumni scholarships because they maintained their marks, there are about 90 students currently attending the University of Windsor on alumni-sponsored scholarships.

"The increase of 56 students this year can be expected again next year, and probably more. I believe we have certainly found a great need for our help."

Entrance scholarships, which can continue throughout undergraduate years if marks are maintained, are awarded to students in Canada and the United States who have a 75 per cent or better average in nine Grade 13 papers written in one year or the equivalent standing where there is no Grade 13. In Windsor and Essex County, they are awarded to any who qualify. Outside the county, they are awarded on a quota basis annually.

London Chapter Proposed

A steering committee of London, Ont., alumni elected Mr. and Mrs. James Arend (Fran O'Conner) to head the committee in its preparation for organizing a London Alumni chapter.

Meeting in the London Hotel Oct. 17, the committee of nine alumni decided to hold a further organizational meeting, enlarging its membership to twenty or twenty-five.

A second meeting, scheduled to be held at the Cobblestone Inn on Nov. 7, will discuss means of setting up a formal chapter. No plans have been made for a general meeting of the 70 alumni who reside in the London area.

IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Eugene C. Keyes, former lieutenant-governor of Michigan, died at the age of 62. Born on a farm near Stratford, Ont., Dr. Keyes attended Assumption before entering dental college at the University of Toronto. In 1931, he was graduated from what is now Wayne State University medical school. The following year he opened Keyes Hospital in Detroit, offering low cost hospitalization for the less fortunate. In 1935, he earned a degree from the Detroit College of Law and became a United States citizen. In 1942 he was elected lieutenant-governor of Michigan, teaming with GOP Governor Harry F. Kelly. In 1946 Dr. Keyes was again elected lieutenant-governor as a running mate with the late Governor Kim Sigler. In 1950 and in 1954, he made unsuccessful attempts to gain the GOP nomination for governor. Dr. Keyes was also unsuccessful in his bid for the United States Senate in 1952 and for the post of mayor of Detroit in 1957. He is survived by a brother, Victor, of Detroit.
