OTTAWA, In the greatest hu-manitarian drive the world has ever known, some 60 nations are working hand-in-hand to ssave millions of children in war-de-vastated and poverty-stricken countrie

While the fortunes of the cold war fluctuate between east and west and the peoples of the world tenself listen to threats of atomic warfare, a united nations agency that really works -- the International Children's Emer-gency Fund---is tackling with efficiency and vigor the Problem of millions of hunry, ill and destitute children.

In its first year and a half of active operations, UNICEF allocated \$97,000,000--includink more than \$6,000,000 from Canadian grants and public contributions-worth of vital foods, medicines and technical services to the children of 20 different countries. When full allocations for 1949 are totalled up, it is estima-ted that another \$100,000,000 will have been spent.

Canada is continuing her contributious to UNICEF. The federal government is voting an-other \$1,075,000 to the worldwide arganization and once again UNICEF in Canada is making a public appeal. A.B.
