





GUEST SPEAKER

This year's guest speaker for the Emancipation Day celebrations, Dr. William Holmes Borders from Atlanta, Ga., is acclaimed as one of the great race leaders in the United States.


Dr. Borders is pastor of Wheat Street Baptist Church in Atlanta.' He is one of the most popular speakers of our race," according to W. L. Perry, producer of the Emancipation celebrations.

Dr. Borders is the third generation of ministers in his family. He was born in 1905 in Macon, Ga. His beginning was humble. In his early years he picked peaches in Houston County, cotton in Twiggs County, sold papers on the streets in Bibb County and carried mail in Macon.

A well educated man, Dr. Borders has attended many universities. He has an A. B. degree from Morehouse College; a B.D. degree from Garrett Theological Seminary; an A.M. degree from Northwestern University; D.D. degrees from Morris Brown College, Shaw University and Gammon Theological Seminary. He also studied at Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University.

This year's speaker is the author of five books and has written many articles. His books have been "Follow Me" a collection of sermons; "Men Must Live as Brothers" a book of twenty sermons; "Thunderbolts" a book of religious poems; "God Is Real" a book containing 30 more sermons; "Seven Minutes at the Mike" which is a work containing radio addresses. More than 23,000 of these works have been distributed.

In Atlanta, the Wheat Street Church stood incomplete for 17 years until Dr. Borders took over. In 19 months he built the church into the largest of its kind in the country.



There have been 43 auxiliaries formed in the church, a new religious education plant, and service for the deaf and blind.

Dr. Border's career has been highlighted by a number of events which serve to point out the man's bravery and his convictions.

After Henry Wallace was denied the right to speak in the city auditorium and any white church, he spoke in the Wheat Street Church and told of the real threats coming from the Ku Klux Klan in the South.

Dr. Borders raised \$11,000 to bury the Monroe lynching victims. He led a pilgrimage from



SUPPORT NEGRO BUSINESS

Next time you go out to purchase a loaf of bread, a new dress, a new suit, or whatever it may be, remember the Negro businessman can help you and more important—you can help him.

Sure, you can get things at a store that is closer and more convenient, but, remember your patronage of the Negro business establishments will help stimulate the economic progress of the Negro people and the future depends on the economic well-being of the entire race.

The only difference between the Negro and white men, in most cases, is that the white man has money and the Negro does not.

The biggest move this year to promote Negro business was started by the leaders of The Ancient, Egyptian, Arabic Order, Nobles Mystic Shrine who staged "The Shriner's Salute to Negro Business Enterprise" from June 15-20.

The program was designed to give Negro businesses across the country a financial transfusion. During the week, each Noble and Daughter of Isis was urged to spend a minimum of \$25 with Negro business men and in each succeeding week they pledged to spend a minimum of \$5 with the Negro businesses.

But, once again remember this. One week of support is not enough. Fifty-two weeks of support from every Negro citizen are needed to give the Negro businessman the strength he requires to compete on the open market.

The program to bolster Negro business was developed two years ago by the Imperial Department of Economic Education and was headed by Rudolph Stewart, Imperial Second Ceremonial Master at Washington, D.C.

Imperial Potentate Brooker T. Alexander of Detroit said he began thinking of the project a long time ago.

Mr. Alexander was quoted as saying in the Michigan Chronicle, a weekly Negro newspaper:

"The Mystic Shrine believes that our churches and fraternal organizations must provide the initiative to help our people toward equality and justice."

"We believe that the battle must be waged educationally, economically, financially, politically and legally, each equally important. But to us, the most important is finance and economics.

"We must find more ways and means to earn the dollar and keep the dollar among the people longer.

"We need not expect any other race here (Continued on Page 22)

What the Negro Wants

by Harry Golden

(This article is reprinted with special permission from Mr. Golden, author of the best seller "Only in America" and editor and publisher of "Carolina Israelite" in Charlotte, N.C.)

"What does the Negro want?" Every white man in the South is an expert: The Negro wants "social equality" and he wants to go to bed with white women. And of course these fears bear no relation at all to what the Negro wants. The question itself is presumptuous, because the Negro really does not want anything that is not coming to him as a citizen, and as a matter of law. But if we were to accept the question as pertinent we would find that what the Negro "wants" is directly opposite to what many of the white men fear he "wants."

The white ladies say, "The Negroes do not want 'integration,' my maid told me so." She asks her maid about the Supreme Court decision and the maid says:

"Lordy me, Miz Emily, we never sees the paper." And that night the maid rushes her husband through his supper: "Jim, let's go down to the NAACP meeting and see if we can't light a fire under that 'integration' committee."

The Negro does not ever consider this business of "social equality." He never gives a thought. What he wants is ACCEPTANCE. He is not interested in "INTEGRATION" as a race—he is interested in ACCEPTANCE as a man.

The Negro is not interested in going to the white man's school as much as he is interested in sending his children to a school that will give them the maximum education that tax-supported facilities provide.

He is not interested in going to the white man's beach, as much as he is interested in enjoying the sun, the sand, and the water as freely as his white neighbor. He is not interested in white women; he is vitally interested in ridding his culture of its dehumanizing matriarchy; that because of the more regular earnings of the female domestic, and the lack of skills and education of the male, he is really nothing more than a sort of itinerant vagrant. He wants to become the head of his household—a man.

Thus what the white man fears the Negro "wants" is completely opposite to what the Negro does want. Better job opportunity would be first, political equality would be second.

The South could settle this matter with the acceptance of a few realities:

PERRY LETTER

By WALTER PERRY

I have been asked hundreds of times, "What happened to you, Perry, and the Emancipation Celebration last year?"

In answering to some people I have related the true picture. To others I have been reluctant as I am trying to protect the future of the Emancipation Celebration and what it has stood for for the past 25 years under my directorship. In short, we as Negroes still have to expect second class citizenship in many instances. We can only gain full recognition by proving we have the qualifications in all occupations. We must meet many demands as Negroes and it cannot be measured in dollars and cents, for if it were, the Celebration would lose its purpose.

Financial trouble started through an act of God in 1956 when there was four days of rain which resulted in a loss of several thousands dollars. In 1957, 16 days before the Celebration was to start, there was the grand-stand fire at Jackson Park. This again resulted in a revenue loss.

In 1958, the Mayor, with his own chosen committee, forced me to give up the directorship and they took over. Some money was to have been borrowed from the city. It was

to have been paid back, but it was never forthcoming.

I had to put up a strong argument to be a member of the board. I was finally accepted and hired at a salary of \$3,000 per year. I was to get \$250 the first of each month starting the first of May. I have not received the first month's salary.

At board meetings, I was asked on four different occasions to leave the room by the chairman. Yes, I was burned up at the request, but gritted my teeth and did so.

As the Celebration drew near, it was realized that finances were not up to expectations and a few unofficial meetings were held between the "big three" but were not reported in detail to the whole board. A vote was taken to cancel the parade. It was illegal because one member voted to cancel the parade over the phone. He had resigned months previous, but it was never presented at a regular meeting of the board.

All outstanding debts were assumed by this board and they were to deal with creditors. One creditor got a default judgment for \$920. The final financial statement was made on December 30, at which time all members resigned. A loss of \$835 was shown. This was wrong. Also included should have been

in America or elsewhere to do this for us. In the words of Booker T. Washington, we must lift ourselves by our own bootstraps, despite the fact that 43 percent of Negro families in America receive an annual income of less than \$2,000."

Mr. Alexander said that cooperative effort is the key to the economic success of the Negro.

Mr. Alexander added that, "We believe that the custom must be generated among our people that a portion of their wages must be spent among our busines entrepreneurs. This custom will aid greatly toward making the business of our people stronger.

"It will aid them to better meet competition; and it will aid them to employ more of our younger people. It is foolish to expect our friends here in America to employ our young people in their businesses in preference to their own," Mr. Alexander said.

In a few simple words, the facts are these. Today the Negro is in a very competitive society and the small businessman is struggling to exist. Already faced with innumerable problems, he should not have to worry about lack of support from his own people.

Support your own businessman and you support yourself.

- 1. The Supreme Court will not reverse itself on this issue.
- 2. The law must be obeyed. The South is law-abiding.

Now when we and our politicians are ready to accept these realities, we can ask men and women of good will everywhere to accept another reality—

That there are sections of the South which will not "integrate" the schools in our generation.

But we of the South cannot ask acceptance of this third reality unless we are willing to accept the first two. And unless these realities are accepted we face the possibility of the destruction of our system of public education, which would be the greatest of all calamities to both the white and Negro races of the South.

There are sections of the South where the integration of the races can be accomplished with a minimum of trouble.

There are other sections where the school authorities may want to build up the standards of the Negro schools first in order to catch up with the more advanced white students based on the better "white" facilities of the past.

(In my own highly progressive state of North Carolina a dozen of our high schools (white) have used a linotype machine in one of their courses for at least 2 years, but not a single Negro high school has ever offered such instruction anywhere in the state); and, finally there are sections of the South where HISTORY alone will have to do the job.

We learned long, long ago that hate merely breeds more hate, but by the same token, we also know that wisdom is equally contagious.

Walter Perry — "Mr. Emancipation"

(Cover Story)

Mr. Emancipation is back.

After acting in a lesser capacity during the 1958 Emancipation Celebrations, Walter Perry has again taken full control of this year's four-day program and has his usual gala list of events arranged.

Walter has truly earned his title of Mr. Emancipation over the years. His celebration is the only one of its kind in the world and attracts thousands of people of all races to Windsor.

It was in the year 1833 that Parliament in England abolished slavery in the British Empire and proclaimed Negro emancipation.

This celebration marks the 128 year of freedom for the Negro in the British Empire and is the 28th year that Emancipation Day has been celebrated in Windsor. One of the main purposes for the celebrations, according to Walter, "is to bring American Negroes to Canada to visit friends and relatives who took the underground railway to freedom while slavery was still present in the United States."

Windsor was a main terminus of the underground railway and through its operation, many American Negro slaves found freedom in Canada. Walter says that the American Negro "appreciated the protection given to them by the British" and therefore visit Canada each year during the Emancipation Celebrations.

Walter Perry was born in Chatham Twp. in 1899. In 1907 his father died and his family moved to Windsor. He has lived on Mercer St. ever since he came to the city. Walter attended Mercer Street School, now the Western Ontario Institute of Technology, which is next door to his home. He spent his high school days at Windsor Collegiate, now Patterson Collegiate.

In 1909 Walter began selling papers. Today, his friendly face, cigar dangling from his mouth, can be found every morning at the pedestrian entrance of the Detroit-Windsor Tunnel as he provides commuters with their morning paper. Walter says that with his job he is "free to do what I want and can participate in many activities."

Walter was too young to be involved when the idea of Emancipation Day first got started. More than 60 years ago there used to be a celebration near the present Ambassador Park. This event ended about 1916. Walter says he used to attend but there was "no dignity then" compared to his show.

By 1931 Walter says he could see the progress the Negro people were making and wanted to show others this. "I wanted a chance to show the cultural part of the Negro," according to Walter. Thus, the Emancipation Day as we know it now was born.

Walter claims that it was 1937 before others began to come and see what was going on. They have been taking part in the event ever since. Walter has brought some of the biggest names in the world to his celebrations over the years. Some of his guests have been, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, Mary McLeod Bethume, Martin Luther King, Benjamin Mays,

To American Visitors

Visitors returning to the United States from Canada are now permitted a total customs exemption of \$500. This includes the \$200 previous exemption and the additional exemption of \$300 effective May 20, 1948.

In addition to the customs exemption of \$200 previously allowed, a United States resident who has been in Canada at least 12 days may bring back into the United States, free of duty, articles aggregating up to but not exceeding \$300 in value as an incident of the trip from which he is returning. These articles, which do not include distilled spirits, wines, malt liquors or cigars, must have been purchased in Canada for personal use, not for resale. This additional \$300 exemption is allowed only once every six months. Should any article exempted from duty under this provision be sold before three years have elapsed, the declarant will become liable for penalties equal to double the duty at the time of importation.

The \$200 exemption applies to purchases when visitors have been in Canada for 48 hours, and is allowed provided at least 30 days have elapsed since the last \$200 exemption was claimed. It may include cigarettes, tobacco, food-stuffs, not more than 100 cigars, and not more than one wine gallon of alcoholic beverages.

Each member of the family is entitled to the exemption of \$200 or \$400, as the case may be. When a husband and wife and minor children are travelling together, the articles included within the exemption provisions may be grouped and allowances made without regard to which member they belong.

In either case a declaration must be made before a U.S. Customs Officer upon the first return to the United States. Articles not declared cannot be exempted from duty.

Rain, the grandstand fire a few years ago at Jackson Park, and other setbacks have hit him hard, but Walter always comes back fighting. "I've never made a quarter off this Celebration and sometimes I don't know where I get the money from. It gets more expensive every year to put on the show," Walter said. "This year will tell whether I can produce the show any more in Windsor," he added.

No matter what happens to his show, there will never be another Walter Perry. He is one of the most colorful and best-liked figures on either side of the border. Jackson Park at the first of August would be a pretty sad sight if Walter Perry and his friends were not there adding joy and prestige to Emancipation Day.






