January Construction Tops Million Dollar Mark

SANDWICH WEST ISSUES 106 PERMITS

The construction picture in Sandwich West Township took a lopsided turn last month, a remarkable turn for the better, out still too had to believe.

In a building report from Building Inspector George Hooker, a total of 106 permits were issued at a value of slightly over a million dollars, \$1,000,350 to be exact. Or for comparison purposes, the total value of building started in 1953's first month, was 118 times the value for the corresponding period of 1952.

During January, 1952, four permits were issued at a total of \$8,500. These were for one residence, one commercial establishment, and two miscellaneous repair jobs.

The figure above is a mere drop in the bucket compared to the month just past, with permits issued for 97 residences, valued at \$980,600; four garages (\$4,000.); four commercial establishments, \$15,500; and one miscellaneous piece of work at \$250. The 106 permits make a grand total of \$1,000,350.

For the most part, the residences are being built by large firms, Economy Home Builders Bersch Construction Company, and Morris Construction Limited with only a few of the permits for homes having been issued to private individuals.

The Economy Home firm has begun a project to build 100 homes on Dominion Boulevard and 20 more on Grand Marais Road, while the Morris Company is developing a new street in the township, with plans for 57 new units.

In all three cases, the firms are installing and financing all local improvements, such as water-c mains, sanitary sewers and pavement.

Of the four permits issued for commercial purposes one is for a six-room addition to the Highway Motel, owned by Ella Peters; another for a greenhouse on No. 18 Highway, now being built by George Parozanin; the third is a fruit and vegetable Stand on 18 Highway, to be started in May or June by Mr. Sawryluk; while the last permit is for an addition to the club room at the Roseland Golf Club which is now under construction.

The showing for January is unusually high. In most cases, January is the poorest month of the year, but this year's picture shows figures having nearly reached one-third of the final 1952 total of \$3,274,200.

Several church and school groups are now canvassing homes to register those receiving the ex- amination. Chairman of this com- mittee is Mrs. Albert Reaume

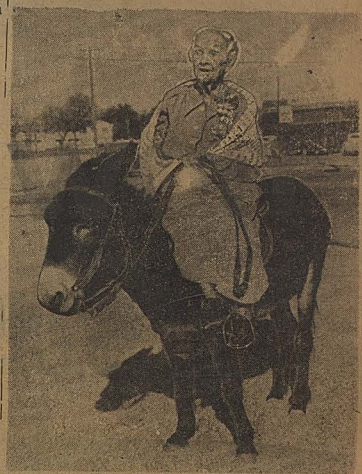

The local Girl Guide Associa- tion will meet on Wednesday evening, February 11 at 8 p.m. in the council chambers of the LaSalle Town Hall.

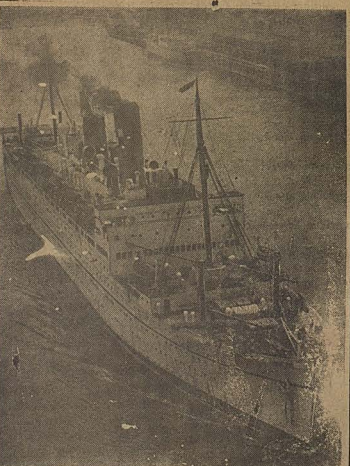

Life Saving Award Won by Amherstburg Guide

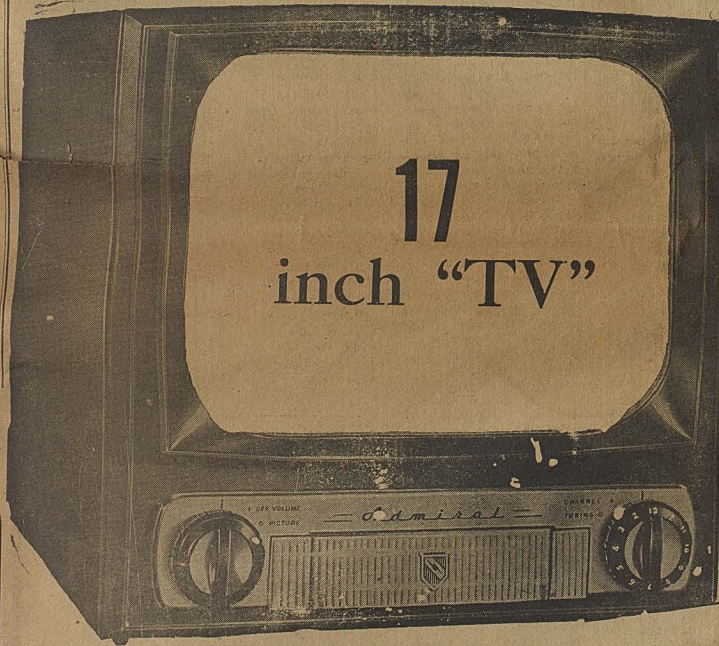
For the first time in many many years in this part of Canada, the Girl Guide Gilt Cross, an award for proficiency in life-saving, has been won by a member of the Guide Association.

S.W. Council To Meet Builders

A meeting is scheduled for Tuesday evening, Feb. 10, between Sandvich West Council and representatives of construction firms now in the midst of building homes in the area.

Purpose of the meeting is for council to hear what is anticipated by these builders in the line of new homes for 1953, how many are planned, how they will be financed and what is to be done to provide local improvements. Also to be discussed are plans for new school, additional classrooms to schools, and the new water main scheduled for the township.

During the month of January 97 permits were issued by the township's building inspector, George Hooker, for new dwellings. For the most part, the homes are being erected on a large project scale by three large Windsor firms — Economy Home Builders, Bersch Construction and Morris Construction, and in all cases, local service improvements, such as water mains, roads and sewers will be installed and financed by the builders.

It is anticipated that close to 500 new homes will be built during the year, which will increase 1952's total by more than 200.

The meeting will be held in the township hall at 8 p.m.

Ontario Plowmen To Hear World Match Plans

The Ontario Plowmen's Association, which sponsors the International Plowing Match, will meet in session in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto on February 2nd and 3rd. According to F. A. Lashley, Association Secretary this promises to be one of the most important conventions in the history of the organization, because of the forthcoming World Match to be held in Canada this year, in conjunction with the International. Delegates will hear J. D. Thomas, Director World Governing Board at the noon luncheon on February 3rd report on plans for this great event.

Many topics relative to plowing matches, such as Soil Cultivation; Proper Use of Equipment, etc., are to be discussed. E. R. McClellan, Department of Education will discuss Secondary School Participation in Plowing Matches; S. L. Tallman, Massey Harris Co., will address the convention on Recent Advancements in Soil Cultivation.

Delegates from four counties in Ontario, plan to appear before the convention offering facilities for holding future matches. Northumberland and Durham Counties will be the hosts for 1953 and Waterloo county in 1954. Essex county is making elaborate plans for 1955 while Ontario County is interested in having the match in 1956.

LaSalle Council Notes

All members present: Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted on motion of Messrs. Lovell and Martin.

Mr. Masson, Inspector of Insurance for Gore District Mutual Insurance Company, addressed the Council outlining the additional benefits of a comprehensive liability policy over the policy they now have. He is to send them a breakdown of the complete coverage before the policy has to be renewed in March.

Sixteen owners of property abutting on Bezaire drain presented a petition to the Council to have that drain cleaned out. Reeve Nutkin stated that he was considering this work and promised to obtain competitive prices for the work to be presented to the next meeting of Council. The petitioners were assured the work would be done this spring.

A letter from the Town Solicitor, Donald R. Morand, regarding a dog by-law was read (Copy printed in LaSalle News two weeks ago). Mr. Morand pointed out that according to the existing by-law every dog has to have a license and no dog is permitted to run at large at any time unless accompanied by and under the control of its owner.

An offer was received from Alvin Brunet to purchase lots 93, 94 and 95, plan 793.

Jules Deschamp also made an offer to purchase lots 238, 240, 1172, 1173 and 1178, plan 793.

A lengthy discussion arose regarding the vacant property owned by the town and which is for sale at reasonable prices. In all, the town has 511 desirable lots for sale. It would be profitable to the residents of this town to have this property at the prices they are available at present. Anyone interested in knowing more about these lots, location prices, etc. come in to the Town Hall and inquire. Council is taking steps to advertise these lots for sale.

Members of the Council are very disturbed about the carelessness of hunters in the eastern part of the town and the dangerous discharging of firearms near dwellings and near highways. There was a lengthy discussion as to the best way to come with the situation. It was agreed that until some system of controlling the hunters is worked out, persons hearing the discharge of firearms or seeing hunters near their homes should notify the police at once.

Questions & Answers

What is a "putative marriage"?
—Mrs. Anne T. Nelson.
It is a marriage that is actually invalid, but has been entered into in good faith by at least one partner. Such marriages remain putative ("putative" here means "supposed as valid") until both parties obtain certain knowledge that the marriage is not a valid one. The children of a putative marriage are legitimate as far as the Church is concerned.

What are the Jesuit "relations"?
They are a series of letters written by the early Jesuit missionaries to their superior and others in Europe. Selections of these were published each year from 1581 to 1654. Those written by the French pioneers in North America were intended for general circulation, and are a rich source of the early Christian history of Canada and the U.S., particularly with regard to the Indians.

The word "creation" has here the sense of promotion to a dignity. All Cardinals are freely chosen by the Pope himself, and this "creation" is effected by the delivery, first of the scarlet skull-cap (zucchetto), and then of the scarlet biretta usually by the Pope personally. The red hat is given at a public consistory and is not thereafter used. It is hung above his tomb and remains suspended there until it disintegrates.
