

Sunnyside Tavern Installs New Neon Lights

An asset to the town of LaSalle as well as an asset to Sunnyside Hotel are the newly installed neon lights surrounding the outside of the famous roadside tavern.

Neon tubing has been installed under the eaves of the building, and on the front of the hotel is a large multi-colored sign with the name of the tavern and several items relative to the features offered there.

With the installation of the new bright lights, the tavern is transformed into a wonderful beauty spot by night to the hundreds of passing motorists on Highway 18. The famous old building, owned by George Carlino, is on the bend in the road leading from LaSalle southward to Amherstburg, and is a famous night-spot to tens of thousands every year. A step like this taken by a local businessman is always an asset to the town.

LaSalle Firemen Fight 2 Field Fires

Two grass fires brought out the LaSalle Fire Department to check blazes in the Sandwich West area over the Easter weekend.

No damage was reported by Fire Chief Jack Wells, but a home at the corner of Victoria Road and the track crossing was endangered by flames and checked just in time by the volunteer fire force. The field adjacent to the home was on fire and threatened to spread to the nearby home.

With the help of neighbours, the fire department managed to extinguish both fires before any serious damage could be done.

As already mentioned, both fires took place in Sandwich West. The township, however, officials were well pleased with the returns, most of which were contributed by residents of LaSalle, Sandwich West, River Canard and the immediate surrounding district. Assistance came also from citizens in neighbouring municipalities as well as Windsor and Amherstburg, and even as distant as points throughout Michigan.

Churchill Fund Nets Over \$3,500

As a result of the warm-hearted community spirit of LaSalle, Sandwich West and district residents, the Churchill family who lost their seven-month-old son, their home and all personal possessions in a blaze several weeks ago, are to have a new home built for them on the property adjacent to their former home on Reaume Road.

This has been made possible through the Churchill Fund, established on the scene of the disastrous blaze by the mayor, council and several community minded citizens, with the objective of raising funds to help the Churchill family find a new hold on life and start anew.

At the finish of the fund-raising drive, over \$3,500 had been turned in to fund officials, most of the money having been raised by district residents.

One-third of the total was raised in one night alone, when George Carlino, proprietor of the Sunnyside Tavern, graciously offered the facilities of his hotel for a benefit party staged by a number of LaSalle business men and public officials. As a result of the party, which drew people from as far as Michigan, the sum of \$1,200 was raised. Credit for this tremendous boost is directed to a five-man committee comprised of Louis Chappus, Bart Evon, Pete Laframboise, Harry Boisnier and LaSalle Councillor Ted Clarke, who all spent many hours in finalizing plans for the event. This was held on March 10.

An additional promotion move to swell the total of the fund was a benefit dance at the Rainbow Garden on March 27, supervised under the direction of Ed Gignac, Bill Munro and Councillor Jack Trotter. Approximately \$200.00 was raised as a result of this effort.

Tentative plans have been drawn up for a one-storey frame dwelling to be built on property adjacent to the Churchill's former home on Reaume Road. Mr. Churchill purchased the land from his parents. The entire proceeds of the fund drive will be directed to the cost of the new home, and Mr. Churchill has met with the fund committee on an agreement that he will provide the additional funds for the construction materials and labor. It is anticipated that carpenters, plumbers, electricians and other tradesmen might voluntarily offer their services to get the work

on the home done at the lowest possible cost to the Churchills.

Original objective of the fund was \$5,000, but nevertheless, officials were well pleased with the returns, most of which were contributed by residents of LaSalle, Sandwich West, River Canard and the immediate surrounding district. Assistance came also from citizens in neighbouring municipalities as well as Windsor and Amherstburg, and even as distant as points throughout Michigan.

Officials of the fund committee, at this time, wish to express through the medium of this newspaper, their sincere thanks and appreciation to everyone who helped to make the drive an overwhelming success by opening up their hearts and purse-strings to help someone in need. Without the assistance of all those who contributed, whether in large or small amounts, this achievement could not have been reached.

Thanks go out too, to the many volunteer canvassers and workers who solicited funds and played a part in the Sunnyside and Rainbow benefits. And last, but not least, to the owners and management of the two above business establishments who offered the use of their facilities for the benefits.

The league will be formed along the same lines as in past years, with players consisting of both teenagers and older men. Four teams were in the local league last season, and it is anticipated that at least that many, if not more, will be formed for 1953.

When the league started last year, four teams were gathered together for the start of the season, but as weeks passed, more and more LaSalle teenagers and younger men came forth with a request to seek a position with one of the teams. Officials of the league found it difficult to organize more teams late in the season and they finished the year with the same number of teams with which they began.

Sponsors of last year's teams were Bart Evon, Sunnyside Hotel, Ray's Barber Shop and Sunnyside Garage. Nothing definite will be known until the outcome of Sunday's meeting whether or not these same establishments will sponsor a team for 1953.

In any event, it is expected that perhaps six teams, rather than four, will make up the league this season.

Mr. Trotter is also an official of the LaSalle Youth Centre.



Old Champion Passes On



Baked Spareribs—marinate that's best pepper with onions, apples and


Baked Spareribs with Sauerkraut

Two slices spareribs salt, pepper, 1 large can sauerkraut, 1 small onion, 2 apples, 2 cloves, 1/2 tsp. caraway seed, 3 tbsp. brown sugar.

Cut spareribs into serving size pieces. Put a layer of ribs in the bottom of a large roasting pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper.

seasonings is an old-time favorite.

Combine kraut with chopped onion, chopped apple, cloves, caraway seed and brown sugar. Cover ribs with kraut mixture, then top with rest of ribs. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and paprika. Add a little water if sauerkraut seems dry. Cover pan and bake in a 325 degrees F. oven for 1 hour. Uncover and cook another half hour. Serves 4.





St. Anthony The
 One of the turnings points in the history of civilization was in the Battle of the Milvian Bridge over the River Tiber near Rome in 312 AD. Here it was that the army of Constantine outnumbered five to one, met and defeated the

forces of the tyrant Maxentius. Shortly before the battle, Constantine had a vision in which he saw in the heavens the Christian cross inscribed with the words, "In this sign thou shalt conquer."
 As a result of this victory gained with divine help, Emperor Constantine became most favorable towards the followers of the True Faith. He granted them freedom of worship and thus paved the way for Christian Rome's golden era.
 Down through the ages the sign of the Cross has been the most wide spread and venerated symbol of the Christian faith. For it was on a crude cross of rough wood that Christ died to bring salvation to the world. And ever since that first Good Friday, the Cross has always turned the tide of victory against the forces of evil.
 Saint Anthony knew full well the power of this sign of salvation. There is a story told of him as a young lad before he became an Augustinian

Canon. Ferdinand, as he was then known, had formed the habit of dropping in every afternoon for a visit at the Cathedral in Lisbon to seek God's guidance in prayer.
 One evening, while kneeling there engrossed in talking with his Lord, young Ferdinand was suddenly assailed by a severe temptation. According to the legend, Satan appeared to him in a most hideous human form and began persuading him not to enter religious life.
 At first, Ferdinand was terrified at this physical presence of the evil one. Then he recalled something of the quering power of the Cross. Bending down with his forefinger the youth traced the sign of the Cross upon the steps leading to the sanctuary.
 At that instant the terrible apparition disappeared, and the violent temptation left Ferdinand. Once again the Cross had conquered.
 And what is more wonderful, the next day on the very spot where Ferdinand's finger had marked the cross, there was observed in the hard stone step a deep sign of the Cross as though one had run his finger through soft butter. Perhaps it was God's way of confirming the present holiness of the future Saint Anthony.
 Many other miracles of St. Anthony were accomplished with the sign of the Cross: poisoned food made harmless, broken glassware made whole, and even the dead raised to life.
 But the most important use Anthony made of this sign of

salvation was in his priestly work of bringing down God's graces upon his fellowmen. Consider the many souls to whom he gave spiritual life by the watery sign of the Cross in Baptism, or whose entrance into heaven he speeded with the crosses of Christ in the final anointing.
 Who can tell how many souls he led with the Bread of Life consecrated at his daily renewal of Calvary's sacrifice in which the sign of the Cross so frequently occurred. And how many thousands of souls, dead in the grip of mortal sin, did he not bring back to spiritual life when he traced the sign of the Cross in the confessional and pronounced the words, "I absolve thee from thy sins."
 Yes, St. Anthony knew and used the power of this sign of apostolic life here upon earth. And even down until the present day, his intercessory power in heaven is still available when invoked with the sign of the Cross.


