Sandwich West Tax Rates Outlined

A three-mill increase in the general tax rate has been levied on residents in Sandwich West Township, with mill rates of 24 and 26 having been struck by the township council two weeks ago.

The rate of 26 mills has been levied on taxpayers who are provided with garbage collection while those who are not provided with this service are paying taxes at the rate of 24 mills on the dollar. 1952 rates were 23 and 21 mills respectively.

Public school supporters in Area 'A' have had a sharp increase levied this year by the school board, to cope with the expensive building program underway this spring. Six new classrooms which are being added to two of the area's schools necessitate the jump in the levy from 20 and one half mill in 1952 to 26 mills this year.

Area 'B' taxpayers are also paying an increased rate this year. A two-mill increase is noted in this area bringing the tax rate to 14 mills on the dollar.

This increase, too, as in Area 'A', is necessary for new construction which is to start under way shortly at Malden Road Public School where a one-room addition is slated for completion by September.

In both areas, the mill rate increase is also being used to cope with rising maintenance costs and increased teachers' salaries. Present members of the teaching staff in township schools have been given pay raises, and in addition, seven new teachers to be added to the staff in September will necessitate increased revenues.

An increase of 50 percent has been levied on Separate School supporters, with the 1953 mill rate set at 15 mills. Last year's levy was 10 mills. No information was available at this writing as to what use the increased revenue would be put, but it is expected that a building program will be underway this year with the separate schools.

Township clerk Louis Durocher has announced that this year's assessment in Sandwich West will be \$8,700,000.

Low Temperatures And Frost Give Setback to Crops

Despite a setback by a few days due to a recurrence of wintry weather last week, LaSalle and district farmers have swung back into action with their spring planting chores.

Those who played the part of the early bird before it was certain as to whether or not Jack Frost had departed until another year, feel the brunt of the temperature change in their radish crop planted several weeks ago. Approximately one-third of the radishes already planted were killed by the frost which came with 28-degree temperatures last Monday evening. The remainder of the crops in radishes survived the cold blast.

Cabbage and lettuce were severely damaged which will set them back two or three weeks.

Last Tuesday saw tractors again being put to work in the fields as farmers started anew with their spring crop planting. This being the last week of April and the fourth week of spring, it can hardly be expected that any further wintry blasts will return to the scene this year.

Nonetheless, that's what every one brought week ago when the first signs of spring arrived. And look what happened! Which just goes to show—never put confidence or faith in the weatherman's predictions. Those frost-bitten radishes will vouch for that.

County Farmers Seek American Outlet for Produce

Approximately 50 members and guests of the Essex County Associated Growers turned out last Tuesday evening to a meeting in LaSalle in an effort to devise ways and means to make new arrangements for the promotion and sale of county produce in Detroit and other Michigan points.

Until July of 1952, Canadian growers brought their produce to the Detroit Eastern Farmers Market for sale. This Market stretches over a mile in length and is unique in the fact that merchandise from every corner of the world can be purchased there, such as nuts from Brazil, tea from Ceylon, cheese from Switzerland, wine from Portugal, tulip bulbs from Holland, and hundreds of items from other points around the globe.

However, in July of that year, the Detroit Eastern Farmers Market Authority decided to call a halt to the importation of Canadian products and this move hit particularly hard at Essex County farmers.

Guest speaker of the evening was Mr. J.E. Butler, Canadian Consul in Detroit, who is active in his efforts to remedy the hardship imposed on the county farmers. Mr. Butler has served as Canadian Consul for the past 25 years, having spent 12 years in Java and Bombay, India. He has been in Detroit since January, 1952.

Following Mr. Butler's talk, a discussion period was held to decide what action might be taken to promote the sale of county produce in the States.

Some wanted to put pressure on American Authorities to reopen the market to Canadians, but it was decided to bypass the Detroit Market and seek new outlets and new market for selling their goods. It is to be understood, that the Canadian growers are not banned entirely from the market with their produce, moreover they are refused permission only in a certain section of the Detroit Eastern Farmer Market.

Members attending the Essex County Associated Growers, which has an enrolment of 580, came from points throughout the County as Harrow, Kingsville, Leamington, Essex, LaSalle, Sandwich West, River Canard and Amherstburg.

Chairman of the meeting was Lucien Antaya, president of the LaSalle Branch of the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association.

Other officials present were Ralph Wright of Harrow, president of the E.C.A.G., Clem Fisher, of the Government Science Service Laboratory at Harrow; Emerson Jennings, assistant Agricultural Representative from Essex; Art Appleton, secretary of the E.C.A.G.; Donald Houle, vice-president of the E.C.A.G.; and other directors of the association.

How The School Tax Dollar Is Spent

An overall picture of expenditures incurred by the Sandwich West Area "A" School Board is illustrated by the following breakdown of how every tax dollar is split up to cover various expenses—

52c Instructional salaries
15c Maintenance of buildings
15c Set aside for debt retirement
8c New construction
4c Books and supplies
4c Transportation
2c Administration, sports equipment and miscellaneous expenses.

These are figures set for 1953.

Amounts for each department may vary slightly year by year, according to the degree of new building undertaken, pay raises granted, additional teachers added to the staff, and other factors.

The Area "A" board is collecting 26 mills this year, which is an increase of five and one-half mills over the 1952 levy.

Arthur Langlois Amherstburg's New Postmaster

Arthur Langlois of LaSalle has been appointed as Amherstburg's postmaster. He succeeds the late J.C. Brundie and took over his new duties on Wednesday morning.

For the past five years Mr. Langlois has been on the staff of the Sandwich Post Office and prior to that time, spent twenty-three years in the postal service in Windsor and Walkerville. He is the son of the late Mr. Idolphe Langlois who was in the Windsor postal service for over 26 years.

Mr. Langlois is married and the father of two children, Doris and Paul.

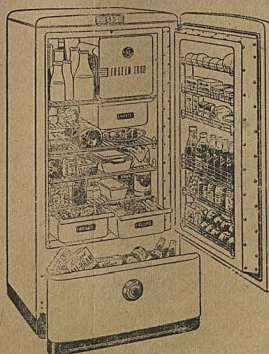

SACRED HEART P.T.A. HEARS TALK ON EDUCATION

Education and the need for increased facilities at Sacred Heart Separate School was the theme of the April meeting of the Sacred Heart Parent-Teachers Association, held Thursday evening, April 16, at the school.

To impress on the minds of all present what lies ahead in the next few years with regard to new school construction, Reeve Albert Nutkins of LaSalle spoke to the group and outlined some of the problems to be faced by Separate School supporters within the immediate future.

New school are essential, there are no two ways about it. But the main problem, as with any project, lies in the ability to raise funds to finance the scheme.

Outside help is definitely needed but from the experience gained last fall by the Sandwich West School board, it is nearly a definite fact that Provincial assistance is not readily forthcoming.

Debentures cannot be sold to Toronto because the town, like nearly any other town and village throughout Ontario is in default, and by being in debt, officials in Toronto feel they may be taking a big risk.

At least two new rooms will have to be added to Sacred Heart by September of this year.

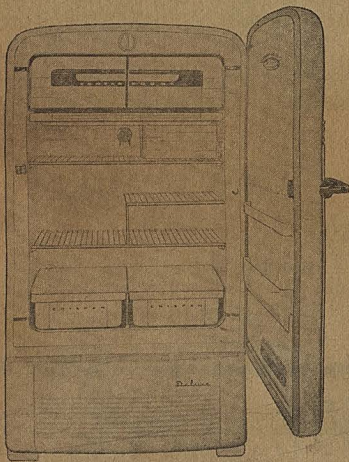

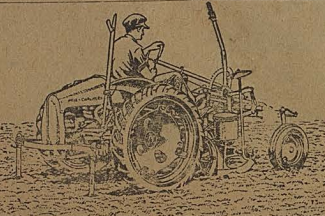
