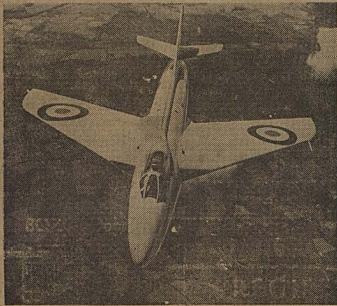

## Federation Discusses Transportation of Hogs

The latest problem of the United Livestock Sales Agency, that of getting Ontario hogs to market at the right place and at the right time, was the main topic of discussion at the September Directors' meeting of Essex County Federation of Agriculture.

A newsletter from the Agency pointed up the basic fact that "price is established at the public market." In other words, if there is the right number of hogs at the Toronto Yards at the right time, the top price can be maintained by the application of the law of supply and demand.

As an answer to this problem, a recent Agency newsletter states: "we report to you as a definite step of progress the formation of a Joint Committee on Transportation for the Ontario Hog Industry. This committee consists of representatives of your elected executive body of the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Board, your appointed Central Selling Agency (United Livestock Sales Limited) and the Livestock Transport Division of the Automotive Transport Association of Ontario.

"The purpose of this committee is to better serve you in the orderly marketing of your hogs. It is the intention of this committee to jointly study an efficient and economic method of transportation from the farms of the Hog Producers to the Stock yards or Packing Plants in accordance with the requirements of the Central Selling Agency whose responsibility it is to establish price."

## Strange Bird Captured

Recently, Mrs. Dan Meloche, Chappus Road, Sandwich West, captured a strange looking bird. It resembles the chicken, owl and hawk, and so, has been given the name, the 'Chowlawk'.

The bird itself has the face of an owl, and a narrow curved beak that resembles that of an owl. Its legs, however, resemble those of a chicken and its claws are much like those of a hawk.

It has a wing spread of 36 inches and the inside of the wings is almost pure white. Exterior feathers are brown with purplish flecks in clusters. When angry the bird gives a warning hiss that could easily be mistaken for the hiss of a snake. It uses its beak for attack on occasion, but prefers to bring its claws into action whenever possible.

For the time being, the Meloche's are keeping the bird in case members of sportsmen's clubs in the district might want to have a first-hand look at it. They also suspect that officials of the Detroit Zoo might be interested in adding the strange "Chowlawk" to their collection.

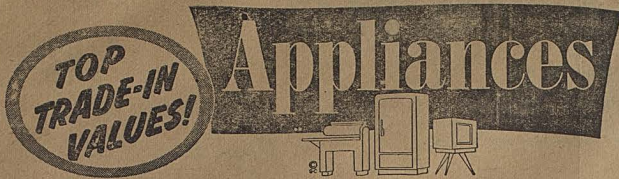
## Softball Playoffs

#### IRATE RESIDENTS DEMAND SLAUGHTER HOUSE OUSTER

Residents of Sandwich West have threatened civil action to drive a slaughter house out of the township.

On Tuesday, September 1st, more than 20 housewives and residents formed up outside the packing house in protest to the foul odours which they claim is making people sick.

Max Grumprich, owner of the slaughter house which is located on Charles street, just off Howard avenue in Sandwich West township, maintains he is complying with all the health regulations. This slaughter house has been operating in this location since 1944. Mr. Grumprich put in special line pits and an underground tile drain last year. Mr. Grumprich said his slaughter house is inspected regularly by government and health officers and "they say this is one of the cleanest slaughter houses this side of Toronto," he said.

Hugh Lambert of Remington Park, spokesman for the group of irate residents, told Reeve Lawrence Brunet that the Sandwich West council could correct the situation by refusing to renew the permit to slaughter.

Reeve Brunet said "It's not so easy. The slaughter house was built and in operation before any building restrictions were imposed, and there must be grounds for revoking a licence".

Residents signed a petition which was presented to the council Tuesday evening.

Reeve Brunet said he would consult with the District Medical Officer from Toronto to

see what can be done to relieve this situation. The only alternative would be for the residents to enter a civil action against the owner of the slaughter house.

#### Home Completely Destroyed by Fire

On Sunday evening, September 6th, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Blondin, River Avenue, Sandwich West, was completely destroyed by fire.

When the fire broke out, no one was at home and a neighbour, Mrs. F. B. Parr, contacted the Sandwich West Fire Department. The Sandwich West Fire Department arrived at the same time as did the La Salle Fire Department. However, the home and furnishings were a complete loss.

## Hydro's Mobile Work Centre Moving to Harrow Sept. 21

Ontario Hydro's 60-cycle changeover program will commence in the Harrow district on September 21, 1953, and on that day a mobile work centre will be set up in the municipality.

Announcing this today, Ontario Hydro Chairman Robert H. Saunders stated that these centres have been brought into use to provide speedy and economical changeover service as the standardization program in Essex County moves farther away from Hydro's main area "P" base in Windsor.

The mobile work centres comprise:  
Two warehouse vans containing conversion materials, motors etc.;

A machine shop van where motor base adaptations etc., are made;  
An office trailer, which maintains radio contact with the Windsor base and vehicles working on changeover in the district;

A workshop trailer in which conversions are made on clocks, pedestal fans, etc., and on phonographs requiring bench work;  
A motor shop trailer; here minor motor repairs and conversions needing bench work are made;

A trailer which handles the paper work involved in connection with completed changeovers;

A diesel generator, which supplies the necessary 60-cycle power, up to 550 volts, for the work centre;

A 100-foot portable platform, complete with flood lighting system.

Replacement parts for appliances are despatched from Hydro's main warehouse at Islington, near Toronto, and reach work centres the day before changeover. These materials are boxed separately for each individual customer, and at changeover time merely have to be loaded into the truck of the technician who is to effect the conversion.

Urgently needed material is obtained from Hydro's area base in Windsor by means of radio-equipped runner vehicles. Direct drive washing machines, which are more economically changed over in a specially equipped workshop, are picked up by trucks from customers' homes and taken to the work centre. From there they are transported to the Windsor base, where the motors and gears are changed.

Work centres can be dismantled, moved and set up in approximately six hours. If work on dismantling starts at 9 a.m., the work centre can be moved and established in a new location some miles distant, and be ready for operation by 4 p.m.

"By establishing these work centres closer to the 'cutover' areas, the time required by the workmen to travel to the homes and other premises concerned is greatly reduced," Chairman Saunders stated.

The work centre to be set up in Harrow was previously in use in Amherstburg.

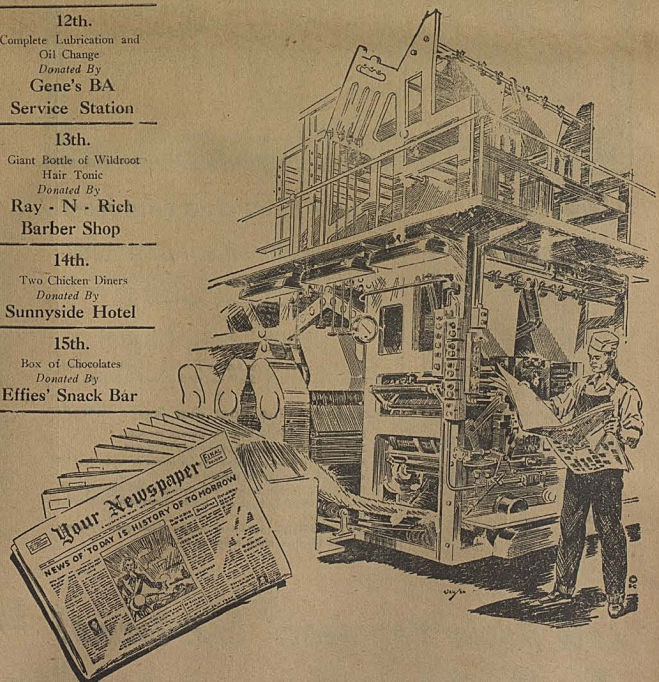
