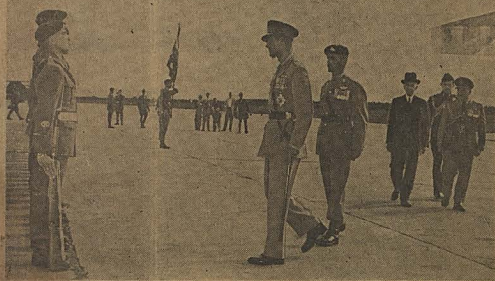

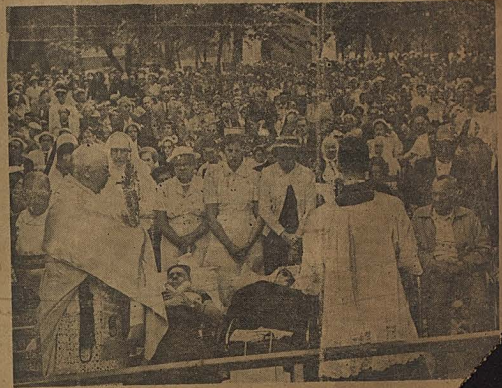

Mayor Rusterlicher also advised the LaSalle Fire Chief, Mr. Jack Wells that he would be held responsible, if the fire equipment were taken out of the town.

The reason for the action is the lack of an agreement between LaSalle and Sandwich W. Such an agreement is vitally necessary for the protection of both parties concerned.

Councillor Totten Assures Higher Water Pressure

According to Councillor Maynard Totten of the Township of Sandwich West, water engineers in the township can expect their pressure to be better, when Windsor completes installations which are contemplated at this time. The installation consists of a quarter-million dollar steel pipe (overhead tank) which will be erected at the corner of Josephine and Sheppard in Windsor, and the completion of the new inlet tube, which is stand-by emergency equipment for raising pressure when it is extremely low.

TEN RULES FOR HOTEL FIRE SAFETY

New Sub-Post Office Located In South Windsor

Establishment of a complete sub-post office to be located at the LaSalle Windsor Pharmacy, 1225 Grand Marais West was announced Tuesday, August 16 by Don Brown, M.P. for Sandwich West. This location in the heart of the South Windsor area is an ideal spot for the sub-post office, and will be a great help to the people of the surrounding area. General delivery mail service will be provided. The Sub-Postmaster to be Mr. George Robinson immediately. Area residents will be relieved to know that now they will be able to pick up mail and post letters, and also obtain stamps and money orders from the new Sub office instead of having to come all the way to Windsor.

Rule 1: Call the Fire Department promptly — investigate afterward. The fire department would rather answer 100 alarms and find no fire than be engaged in flames.

Rule 2: Have enough emergency fire-extinguishing equipment on hand. But remember this is only "first-aid" equipment, and for incipient fires only.

Rule 3: Hold regular fire drills with your employees. Make sure they know where equipment is located, and that they know how to use it. But remember, knowing how to operate emergency equipment does not make your staff a trained fire force. It takes trained firemen to cope with a real blaze.

Rule 4: Examine regularly all emergency equipment — as fire extinguishers, hoses, sprinkler systems — and be sure they are in working order.

Rule 5: Keep fire and smoke doors closed at all times.

Rule 6: Keep all fire exits free of junk and other debris.

Rule 7: Good housekeeping is good fire protection. Check regularly, and keep clean such fire hazards as: kitchen flues, paint storage rooms; carpenter shops; etc.; linen and mattress storage rooms; chimneys.

Rule 8: Conduct a flashlight guest fire-prevention program by using clever signs warning against smoking in bed, warning against careless use of matches.

Rule 9: Make sure there are plenty of ash trays for guests.

Rule 10: Operate a safe hotel, follow the recommendations of your local fire department. Don't try to get by by being simply within the law, go one step better and comply beyond the margin of safety.

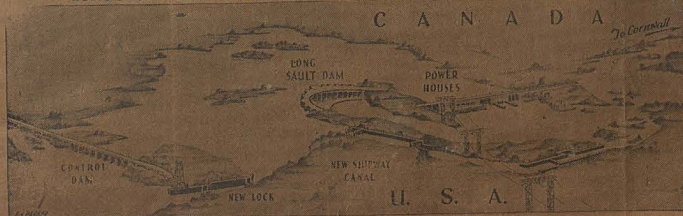

AUSTRIAN PINE CONES IN FALL

8-21 (8)

Since this is the time of year to plan the planting of evergreens and to order them, especially large pines, fir and spruces, it is also the time to warn that many people make the mistake of not giving evergreens the proper amount of show room.

Tall growing evergreens should not be planted close to a house. It is better to use them for specimen plantings. This means they should be properly placed and spaced in an open lawn.

Pines and spruces require a great deal of room. If crowded they soon lose their beauty. Most pines and spruces reach a height of from 40 to 60 feet at maturity. One of the boldest and hardiest of the species is the Red Pine, *Pinus resinosa*, with its long, dark green needles. Even more decorative in a picturesque sense is the Austrian Pine, *Pinus nigra*, shown in the accompanying Garden-Graph. It is extremely hardy and a very rapid grower. The Austrian Pine is also interesting in bloom in the spring and again in the fall when it bears cones, as shown in the Garden-Graph.

Rugged and irregular in outline, the Scotch Pine, *Pinus sylvestris*, is fast-growing and makes a splendid wind-break.

The Norway Spruce, *Picea excelsa*, is probably the most widely planted evergreen in this country. Relatively quick-growing, it is excellent for mass grouping in full sun.

Pine trees can be grown where the soil is too light, sandy and dry for fir, spruces and hemlocks.

what the Council was hoping for. If Mr. Gumplich loses his appeal, it is the intention of the Sandwich West Board of Health to lay a charge, each and every day until the offender removes the cause of the charge, which in this case is the slaughter house.

According to information from Mr. McHenry of the Ontario Hydro, the legal steps required for the township acquiring its own power distribution system (H.E.P.C.) should be adhered to. The first step in this direction is to see if a debenture issue can be floated for the purchase of the system. The Sandwich West Council instructed the solicitor to prepare a bylaw for the township for the borrowing of a million dollars.

There will be a utilities discussion meeting with the town of Riverside on Thursday, Aug. 19.

The case of Mr. Pilon moving back into a house on Boufford Road, Sandwich West after it had been condemned by the Board of Health was brought up for discussion. Legal opinion on the case revealed that there should be no action taken in court, since it wasn't needed. All that should be required, is a 14 member of the Board of Health, supported by any help necessary, and the occupants could be evicted, with force if need be.

Likewise the Hall family, living in the condemned building on Huron Line, had had sufficient notice and could be forcibly evicted, by the Board of Health and whatever officers were considered necessary.

The Imperial Oil Company Ltd. on the corner of Douglal and MacGregor Blvd. objected to the closing of an alley, pursuant to the installation of the Gas Regulator Building. Because of this the entire site has been changed.

Mr. Mitchell inquired about drainage plans for the extension of Ouellette Ave. in Sandwich West. This could be arranged to Douglal Ave. The Council requested the township engineer to prepare a report on areal drainage west of Howard Ave. and East of Douglal Ave. from Edingborough north of Eugenie to Woodal's Driving Range.

The basin drain on Huron Line from the Courland Hotel to north of Kenora are filled in and the drainage is blocked and backing up. This is a Provincial Highway problem, and the township engineer was asked to get in touch with the provincial engineer at Chatham and ask him to check the situation at once.

A resolution from the Sandwich West Township Council requesting the Department of Highways to reconsider their proposed action against the Mid West Lumber Co. and grant them permission to remain in their present location until such time as the highway department needs the property for widening the highway.

The tenders for the construction of the bridge on Todd Lane were opened Wednesday. Total \$3023.00 Masteloto total \$2362.00. The tender was awarded to the Masteloto firm. In the construction the township supplies the cement and steel. The next meeting of the Township Council will be held on Tuesday evening, August 17.

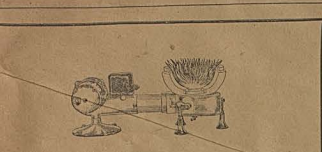

LaSalle Council Meeting -- Aug. 16th

The entire LaSalle Council were present at the August 16 meeting. The minutes of the August 3rd meeting were adopted as read.

An offer to purchase lot 1400 on Huron Street in Plan 703 was made by Mr. Jack Menard. This is a single lot, and it was determined that Mr. Menard already owns lots 1398 and 1399 in this plan, so that this lot will be an extension of the property already owned. Approval was given to this offer to purchase, at the appraised value of \$110.00, subject to the Department of Municipal Affairs.

The Welfare Officers Association, a branch of the Ontario Municipal Association, will hold their Annual Convention in St. Thomas on August 23, 24, and 25 and have extended an invitation to LaSalle to attend. The discussions will take in the following subjects of importance to municipalities: Housing and Hospitalization for Senior Citizens of the Communities. LaSalle Council will request data and minutes of the Convention. Subjects if no one from the LaSalle Council or Staff is able to attend. It was not possible to ascertain at the meeting if a representative from LaSalle will be able to attend.

A lengthy discussion regarding relief applicants in the Town of LaSalle was held, to try and determine if the Town could be held responsible for the housing of those having received their eviction notices during a time of employment. A full investigation of the entire subject is contemplated by the Council in the immediate future.

A letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs in regard to Building Bylaw 348 of the Town of LaSalle requires the addition of a schedule of permit buildings fees, which was overlooked by the town when bylaw was submitted. This will be sent immediately.

The Department of Municipal Affairs is conducting a short course in Municipal Affairs at the University of Toronto from September 13, 14, 15 and 16th. The course is available to Mayors, councils, town officers and members of Boards, free of tuition, and as a service to inform municipalities on the running and machinery of Municipal affairs.

The subjects to be taught include courses on Municipal Administration, General Procedure, Planning and Development, and Plans for General Land Use. The invitation was extended by Mr. G. H. Dunbar, Department of Municipal Affairs. It was suggested that Assistant Town Clerk, Ted Seewald, might be able to attend for LaSalle.

The invitational letter to Dr. Lacharte, Mayor of Ville LaSalle, Quebec, to spend a day in LaSalle has not had time to receive an answer. An invitation to the Mayor of LaSalle, Michigan, will also be extended to Mr. and Mrs. Don Brown, our Dominion representative after it has been ascertained which day Dr. Lacharte will be able to spend there. A fine International note and very good public relations for our town.

A serious discussion regarding hunting in the Town of LaSalle, which each year poses a more difficult problem, was held. Since more and more of the surrounding municipalities are prohibiting hunting in their limits, the increasing burden of these hunters falls upon LaSalle, until we are becoming bogged down with outside hunters. A letter will be written to the solicitor, Mr. Don Morand, to

determine if we may prohibit any but local hunters in the town limits. Letters will be sent to Riverside and Tecumseh to discuss with them what they were able to take, and how it was worked out. Your Council is most anxious to take some action before any injuries, especially to the children of the community.

Mr. Gouveau of Reame Road, inquired if the Council is going ahead with the ditching on Reame Road, and if they are would there be any possibility of having the fill from the ditch used to fill up the end of Adams Lane, where it is all marshy, and stagnant. Reeve Nutkins replied that the town is going ahead with ditching Reame Road, but the first fill for the back-fill would go to the abutting residents, any surplus could possibly be used for filling in Adams Lane.

Mr. Gouveau also informed council that when he was away on a vacation trip, he happened on to a bargain in a 20-30 International Grader and found out pertinent information for the town. Also the fact that the price would be delivered in LaSalle. This grader, Mr. St. Thomas, and council felt that Reeve Nutkins should go and look at it if possible, and since the Welfare Convention is also at St. Thomas, maybe he could take in part or all of that also.

The LaSalle Council and the LaSalle Chamber of Commerce will hold a joint committee meeting on Tuesday night, August 17 at the Town Hall. The subject to be mutually discussed include Planning and Development and Building By-laws for LaSalle. Both bodies being interested in the development of the town, it is felt that a good deal of ground work will be done.

Arrangements for the Town of LaSalle to change its banking facilities from the Bank of Montreal, Windsor to the new LaSalle Branch of the Dominion Bank, were made. The action was unanimous by Council and is to be effected by September 1, 1964.

The whereabouts of some of the LaSalle Debentures will be determined by next Council Meeting. It is hoped to make a bonfire in the Town Park with these.

Information on the mercury vapour light for the town will be brought to the next meeting of Council.

According to information received, there are new living in a small store on Front Road. The Council will attempt to determine, who gave permission for this and if the property is adequate. It would have to comply with the minimum, 600 square foot area, required by the building bylaw. The building inspector was instructed to look into this situation and to report back to Mr. Leon Martin who is chairman of the committee.

The police report showed that there had been 11 speeders ticketed in the last two weeks by the police department. There were some complaints regarding the methods used by the department for catching the speeders but council felt that a tough reputation was an asset to the town-policy if it was instrumental in curtailing the speeding in the town limits.

The Council then went into finance and after discussing the bills to be paid, Council Adjourned.

Next Regular Meeting of the Council will be held on Tuesday, September 7, since Monday is Labour Day.
