The Opening of St. John the Baptist School

Mr. Miles Beaudoin, President of the Separate School Board, was then asked by Father Thomson to say a few words. After thanking those present for their great interest in the schools, he expressed his appreciation to all who had made the building of this school a dream come true.

A group of pupils gave a vocal selection, "Praise Ye the Lord". Mr. Tom Hamilton sang a very appropriate number, "God Bless This House". He was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Harvey Hamilton. Following the program those in attendance made a tour of the school and were impressed by its modernity in all respects especially in lighting, heating, decorations and sound-proof rooms. After the ceremony, tea was served at the K. of C. Hall by the members of the Parent-Teacher Association.


