# **Propose Hwy. Change**

A plan to eliminate the curves on No. 18 highway from Windsor to LaSalle has been submitted to the Department of Highways. The plan calls for the highway to be re-routed so as to continue straight on from McKee's point, through the site of the old Ojibway steel plant, to the right-angled corner at the LaSalle boundary, (Dead man's corner.)

This would allow straight approach to the Turkey Creek bridge from the south. The Town of Ojibway has agreed to donate the land required for the highway.

Brunet, opposed the purchase of radar equipment for the Township Police Department. Answering the letter from the Sandwich West Safety Association Mr. Brunet stated that a radar speed trap to control traffic is similar to leaving open the door of the bank and vault noping that someone might rob the bank so the police can make an arrest.

Councilman Roy Moore defended the radar speed trap saying that a reduction in the speed of traffic would result. Mr. Brunet countered by saying, "You can get the same effect by having just one police car in view. The speed trap requires two men and two cars plus the e-

The Reeve felt that radar would be justified on an extremely dan-gerous street if signs were posted warning the public of the radar. "We want to reduce the speed of traffic, not arrest people." he said.

Councilman Lorne Fitch pointed out that the matter should be placed before the police commission for disposition. The Reeve is a member


