Council Says No To Stadium Opening

The Sandwich West Council has refused to issue a licence to race stock cars at Dayus Stadium. Such a licence would be in contravention to the present zoning bylaws. Windsor Sports Limited has applied to council for permission to hold Stock Car racing at night and Sunday afternoon.

The Motel owners and the residents in the area have strenuously objected to the racing in the past and are still objecting to-day. The chief source of contention is the noise of the racing cars.

Reeve Lawrence Brunet of Sandwich West told Mr. Frank Dayus that the Council will not issue a licence but if the races had been held continuously since the passing of the zoning by-law the Council has no legal means to prevent such activity.

Mr. Dayus, owner of the stadium, replied, "If we don't get a decision to-night, I will open the stadium myself." Mr. Dayus must be able to prove that the races have been held without interruption since the bylaw was passed some years ago.

Satisfaction Guaranteed

A ten year old newsboy who until recently delivered morning papers in a big city has, to his customers deep regret, given over his route to a much less efficient young man of eleven.

Number-one boy, beaming, told one of his erstwhile customers the other week that he had certainly enjoyed his job; he had met a lot of nice people.

Number-two boy, who usually leaves the paper where it can be expected to blow away into the street on those mornings when it is not water-logged in a puddle, is likely to end his career as a purveyor of news in the near future, by request. He will, no doubt, tell all and sundry that the people on his route were a pretty grumpy lot.

There may be a lesson here for the oldesters.

Contract Awarded

The contract for the installation of a storm sewer on Rankin Avenue from the Grand Marais drain to Liberty Street has been awarded to Satori and Son Company. The winning tender was the lowest of the 11 bids submitted, calls for the work to be completed in 21 days at a total cost of \$19,901.50. The Engineer's estimate listed the cost of the job at \$21,582.40.

2150 feet of sewer pipe will be buried at a depth of 7 feet under the street. The pipe will be 27 inches in diameter.

The residents on that portion of the street must shoulder 32.88% of the cost of the project. This will amount to approximately \$2.85 per foot of property frontage. The fittings and the cost of connecting the sewers from the homes to the main sewers is not included in the price per foot. The connection will cost the ratepayer between \$65 and 70. The resident may pay for the connection in cash or make ten yearly payments with his taxes.

Between Satorio's bid and the next lowest, the difference was only \$95.18

Miles to Go!

Reeve Lawrence Brunet told the Council that the Township had cleaned out more than 15 miles of drainage ditches and still has 36 miles yet to do. According to the Reeve, the cleaning programme fell behind last year because of the time spent repairing the leaks in the sewer system. "We are buying more equipment to speed up the programme," he said.

The subject came up when 2 residents on Todd Lane appeared before Council to complain of flooding conditions along the street. One resident stated that the water in his basement is interfering with his furnace and he other resident complained of water covering his property.

A frozen culvert was suggested as the cause but the Council was told the same condition existed last July.

The Reeve assured the residents that the matter would be looked after as soon as possible.

Township Purchases Steam Jenny

The Sandwich West council, last Tuesday evening, approved a tender for the purchase of a steam jenny at a cost of \$1085. The jenny, a portable steam plant, will be used to unthaw frozen culverts and to remove salt residue from the township trucks and machinery.

The Reeve stated that most other municipalities are using a steam jenny and find them most satisfactory.

Purchase Regardless Of Interest

Melchior Palyi, one of the worlds most lucid economists, again brought to attention recently the difference between sound and unsound financing of goods. If all people saved money until they could pay cash for the goods they buy, it would not lead to nearly as much prosperity. Certainly a good deal of the economy is based on consumer credit of one kind or another. This comes to mind in the current discussion of whether finance companies and other sellers of credit are exacting too much in the way of interest and service charges. But the main test is whether the goods bought on credit will be worthwhile after they are paid for. There are many, many consumers who would buy what their fancy suggests no matter what the rate of interest.

Fluoridation By-law Requested

The Windsor Public Utilities Commission has asked Sandwich West and Sandwich East for a ruling on the question of fluoridating the water supply.

The township solicitor, Mr. J. McMahon, informed council that both he and the solicitor for the city of Windsor agree that a by-law is not necessary, since Windsor Utilities Commission sells the water to the Township.

The council has decided to inform the city of the solicitor's opinion. No action was taken to pass the required bylaw.

Ask Grant For Retarded Children

The retarded children's Association has asked the Sandwich West township for a grant of \$1,111.12 toward the cost of constructing a 2 room extension to their present school. The total cost of the addition is \$25,300.00

The Association informed council that there are 81 children attending the school between the ages of 6 to 18. Many of the children attending the school can attend class only one half day because of the overcrowded conditions.

The request was referred to the budget but the council promised sympathetic consideration.

Registration at Prince Andrew School

Registration will be held at the Prince Andrew Public School, corner of Malden Road and Kelly Road, at 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. on April 4th.

Children wishing to register must be 6 by December 31st, 1962.

Please bring the child, their birth certificate and any available medical record.

Beware - The Perils Of Canada

He interfered with the best of intentions. He was thrown out of the house by the lady for what she called unwarranted interference in her private affairs.

So when you have a complaint, make it by all means, but do so in a polite manner. Remember that the Councillor is human too. And a little butter goes a long way.

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
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Around the Edges

The Windsor City Council, last week, delayed a decision on a request for a postponement of the annexation hearings. Although the city's solicitor was in favour of the request, the Council held a meeting, closed even to the solicitor, and decided on the delay.

This does not display an overly amount of confidence in their solicitor. Why hire an expert if you will not heed his advice? It would appear to be a waste of the taxpayer's money.

Mr. Joe McMahon, solicitor of Sandwich East and West, would inform the public that the request for postponement of the hearing is not an attempt to drag out the problem. He stated that it is impossible to complete the required reports in time, and it would be a "grave mistake to start the hearings when we are not ready."

Both Windsor and the suburbs would have the date set for some-

time after June 15th.

Under the same laws, the Commission does not need the approval of the two communities to fluoridate the water supply. Yet, they are insisting that bylaws be passed by the suburban municipalities.

Her facial features are Anglo Saxon. This attractive child appears healthy and bright and needs to move into a Protestant home with parents who will love her for her own we self.

DALLIS is a shy but friendly little boy of four years. He is of French Canadian origin with brown eyes and hair, medium complexion and attractive features. This active and affectionate little lad wants Roman Catholic parents.

RENE is an 11 year old boy of French Canadian Origin. He is tall, good-looking with blue eyes, brown curly hair and fair complexion. Rene is intelligent, very talkative and friendly. He needs understanding Roman Catholic parents able to give him a lot of attention.

SHERYL is an attractive 6 year old Indian youngster. She has brown eyes, dark brown hair and medium complexion. Sheryl is a bright, observant little girl with a will of her own. She needs Roman Catholic parents who are willing to accept her Indian Racial Origin.

Grace has a clear true soprano sing voice and is in grade 2. She and her sister need permanent parents in a real home.

FRED—6 year old Fred has large appealing green eyes, wavy blond hair and even features. He is rather shy but will hold his own and is quite easily managed. He is well liked and loves school, but it is doubtful if his ability will carry him far academically. Fred has a slight speech impediment which will be overcome with help. Roman Catholic parents with patience, understanding and love could give Fred a feeling of achievement and security.

DICK is a handsome manly little boy who needs his own Roman Catholic parents. He is an Anglo-Saxon of 7 years and in Grade 2 at school. He has blue eyes and blonde hair with even attractive features. The fortunate Protestant parents who are selected for these children have busy and active times to look forward to with the responsibilities and fun of guiding the futures for a daughter and five sons.

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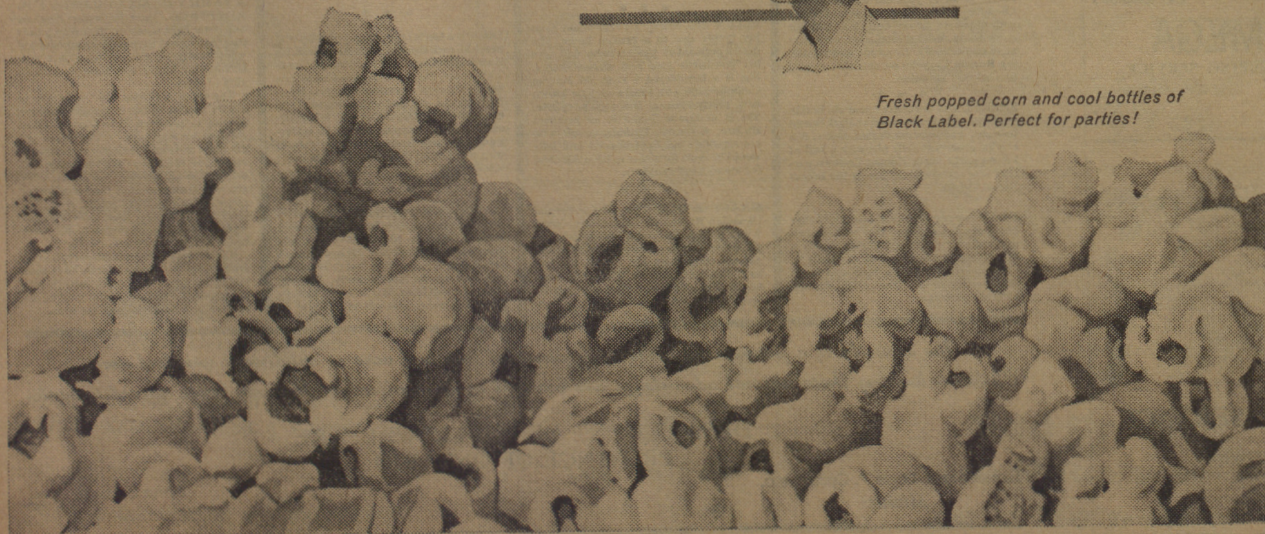
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
