James Flanagan is Hallinan Professor and Chair of Religion at Case Western Reserve University (Cleveland, Ohio). He is Co-Director of the Tell Nimrin excavation in Jordan and in cyberspace, he is founder, president, and director of the Guild for Academic Images Research and the webmaster of its website, "GuildZone."

Walter Goffart, Professor Emeritus, University of Toronto is the author of *Barbarians and Romans, AD 418-584: The Techniques of Accommodation*; *The Narrators of Barbarian History (AD 550-800): Jordanes, Gregory of Tours, Bede, and Paul the Deacon*; and *Rome's Fall and After*. In 1998 he was the recipient of the Festschrift *After Rome's Fall: Narrators and Sources of Early Medieval History. Essays Presented to Walter Goffart*, ed. Alexander Murray.

James Raven, Tutor of History, Mansfield College Oxford, is an historian of eighteenth-century Britain and Europe and their colonies. He recently completed a bibliographical survey of the late eighteenth-century novel. He is director of the Oxford project that examines print culture in London and is recreating the streetscapes and the working environments of the book trade using computer-aided design.

Jeffrey Nisker is Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the University of Western Ontario Faculty of Medicine and coordinator of bioethics, spirituality, and cultural issues. As well as many scientific articles and book chapters, Dr Nisker has written six plays that highlight some of the moral and legal issues involved in breast cancer testing, HIV, and genetic mapping.

Kirsty Duncan currently teaches medical geography at the University of Toronto. Dr Duncan recently completed work on climate change and human health for North America, for the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change. After the 1918 Spanish flu project, Dr Duncan was awarded an international biosafety commendation for her methods for collecting tissue samples from various organs of the deceased miners.
